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Introduction

From 15 to 25 September 2022, Pratoni del Vivaro (ITA) will host the FEI Eventing and Driving World Championships. An iconic equestrian location full of history and prestige, Pratoni del Vivaro has been fully revamped in the build-up to the Championships, ready to welcome the world's best Eventing and Driving athletes and horses, on their quest for medals, glory and the all-important Paris 2024 qualification slots in Eventing.

FEI World Championships: 69 years of top-class equestrian history

The legacy of FEI World Championships spans decades, starting with Jumping in 1953, held in the iconic Parc des Princes, with 19 athletes on the start list representing 11 nations.

The first FEI Eventing World Championship was held in 1966 in Burghley (GBR), with the Argentinian athlete Carlos Moratorio claiming individual gold and Ireland – with a perfectly "mixed team" including two women and two men - claiming team gold. The FEI Eventing World Championships have gone on to be held every four years since 1966, making this the 15th edition.

Two locations have hosted the FEI Eventing World Championship more than once: Lexington and Burghley. Burghley hosted the first FEI Eventing World Championship in 1966 and then a second time in 1974; Lexington hosted the World Championship for the first time in 1978 and then again in 2010 as part of the FEI World Equestrian Games[™].

Six nations have won the team Eventing World title: Canada, Great Britain, Germany, Ireland, New Zealand and USA. Great Britain leads the tally convincingly with 6 wins (1970, 1982, 1986, 1994, 2010, 2018) followed by Germany, New Zealand and USA with two wins each and Ireland and Canada with unique wins in 1966 and 1978 respectively.

Individually, Great Britain is also in the lead with five individual titles - Mary Gordon Watson in 1970, Lucinda Green in 1982, Virginia Leng in 1986, Zara Phillips in 2006 and Rosalind Carter in 2018 (all women!). New Zealand has three individual titles - Blyth Tait in 1990 and 1998 and Vaugh Jefferies in 1994 making it a three in a row for New Zealand. Germany has two individual wins - Michael Jung in 2010 and Sandra Auffarth in 2014; USA also has two individual wins - Bruce Davidson with back-to-back wins in 1974 and 1978. And then we have Argentina and France. Argentina produced the first individual winner - Carlos Moratorio in 1966 and France's Jean Teulere in 2002. Both Bruce Davidson and Blyth Tait are the only athletes to have two individual FEI Eventing World titles to their name.

Women have participated alongside men in all the FEI Eventing World Championships since their inception in 1966. In terms of the individual medals tally, men have a slight advantage with 8 wins for them versus 6 for female athletes. Interesting that all GBR athletes to have won the individual title (5) are women.

For Driving, the first World Championship took place in 1972 in Münster (GER), and they have been held consistently every two years with the exception of 2020 which was cancelled due to covid-19, making this the 25th edition of the FEI Driving World Championships. Apeldoorn in the Netherlands has hosted the FEI Driving World Championships three times (1976, 1982 and 1988). Two locations have hosted the Championships twice: Riesenbeck (GER) and Kecskemet (HUN).

To date, only men have won the individual title and the sport is dominated by men. Women take part in Driving sport and participate in the four-in-hand Championships but are less prevalent than the men at this level of the sport, and tend to be more involved at singles and pairs level, as well as the ponies circuit. Of the 37 registered drivers on the definite entries for the 2022 edition, two are women.

Pratoni del Vivaro – The Phoenix Rises

For lovers of equestrian sport, the name 'Pratoni' sparks memories of past glories. The setting for the Rocca di Papa Equestrian Sports Centre, in the heart of the beautiful Parco dei Castelli Romani, it first became a famous venue for elite equestrianism when it staged the cross country phase of the Eventing at the 1960 Rome Olympic Games. For 50 years, until 2010, Pratoni hosted many international events across the disciplines, from the first Endurance World Championship in 1986 to the 1998 FEI World Equestrian Games™, and two FEI Driving Singles World Championships in 2006 and 2010.

Then it entered a fallow period and the eyes of the world looked away, other venues around the globe attracting the big events and famous names. The fertile parkland fell prey to campers who used the wood from the obstacles and jumps for their fires; to mountain bikers whose tyres tore into the formerly manicured turf, and to the wild boar and moles, protected species who continue to cause havoc during their nocturnal rampages.

But now, in 2022, Pratoni has arisen from the ashes and for two weeks in September, it will be in focus as it stages the FEI Eventing and Driving Four-in-Hand World Championships.

The next phase in Pratoni's history began with the sale of the land to a conglomerate of local residents. A major fundraising project was undertaken by the Federazione Italiana Sport Equestri (FISE) to provide the reinvestment in Pratoni to make it fit once again for top-level equestrian sport. Thankfully, the budget was secured before the Covid-19 pandemic and the planning had already begun.

The man behind much of the rejuvenation is Giuseppe Della Chiesa (ITA). A former eventer and show jumper who was also event director at the 1998 FEI World Equestrian Games™, he has a special bond with Pratoni as it was his father-in-law who purchased the land for the 1960 Olympics. Sadly, he died before he could see his vision realised, but Giuseppe retains the family association, and together with his dedicated colleagues, has diligently prepared the venue for the World Championships 2022 and secure a legacy beyond this year.

There have been many challenges in creating the new Pratoni. Most of the infrastructure has had to be rebuilt, such as the wooden perimeter fences, the grandstands and the stabling area. The stabling was an early priority with the construction of 320 large loose boxes, an onsite veterinary clinic and a spacious washing and cooling area. Refreshing the arenas with new sand and fibre surfaces was another part of the project.

One of the biggest undertakings, both logistically and financially, has been to build the cross-country fences and marathon obstacles. Giuseppe has designed the ridden phase, but Josef Middendorf (GER) was brought in for the Driving. It was important to create mobile obstacles as a wooden structure has a lifetime of about five years if it is fixed to the ground, but ten if it can be removed and stored properly.

One area of the site which remains in use since the heyday is the picture-perfect grass arena where the dressage, jumping and cones are held. New grandstands and fencing have been built, and its position next to a hill, sheltered by trees, is ideal for these phases. Another aspect of Pratoni which is great for large-scale events are the natural viewing areas on the hills in the parkland. Nearly all the eight marathon obstacles and most of the ridden fences can be viewed from the same area, which enhances the spectator experience. The top of the most central hill on the course provides a bird's eye view of the event as it happens and will be where the control box and commentary areas are positioned.

Much of the rebuilding of Pratoni is about adapting to the requirements of the modern sport as well as enabling instant communication, while preserving the natural beauty of the park and not negatively impacting the environment.


FEI World Championships 2022 Venue
