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LONGINES FEI WORLD CUP™ JUMPING 2017/2018 - OSLO OPENER LOOKS SET TO BE A SIZZLER AS SERIES CELEBRATES ITS FABULOUS 40TH!!

All roads lead to final in Paris next April; 13 stops in 10 countries along the way.

The days are getting shorter and the nights longer, but all across Western Europe equestrian fans know that means just one thing - the start of the much-loved Longines FEI World Cup™ Jumping season. And this is going to be a really special one, as the series celebrates its 40th anniversary and the Final returns to Paris (FRA) where it was held just once before, 30 long years ago.

The record books show Germany and the USA neck-and-neck in terms of title victories with 10 apiece, and nothing could demonstrate just how much success means more than the sheer joy of 2017 champion, America's multi-medalled McLain Ward, who won through in a classic finale on home ground in Omaha, Nebraska earlier this year. Because this is one they all want, no matter what other prestigious titles they have taken. The trophy has legendary status and the winners take their place in the annals of equestrian history amongst giants of this hugely popular sport.



It took Ward at least 25 attempts to do it, and he didn't disguise his sheer delight when he succeeded at last. As the new Western European League gets underway in Oslo, Norway next Sunday, the battle for one of the 18 coveted qualifying spots in this region commences. And with five of the top 10, and 11 of the top 20 in the Longines Rankings lining out, the opener looks like a sizzler.

Currently world no. 3, Frenchman Kevin Staut enjoyed another incredibly consistent season when topping the 2017 Western European League table, and he'll be hoping to collect some useful early points on his journey to the 2018 Final which will take place at the AccorHôtels Arena in his country's capital city next April. However Oslo has also attracted so many of the other big names, including Italy's Lorenzo de Luca who has enjoyed an extraordinary run of form over the last 12 months, and the newly-crowned European champion, Peder Fredricson from Sweden.



Add in the 2012 Olympic champion Steve Guerdat from Switzerland who posted a back-to-back double of World Cup wins in 2015 and 2016, and 2014 champion Germany's Daniel Deusser along with so many more, and it's clearly going to be an awesome start to the 13-leg series.



Moving on to superb indoor venues in Helsinki (FIN), Verona (ITA), Lyon (FRA), Stuttgart (GER), Madrid (ESP), La Coruna (ESP), London Olympia (GBR) and Mechelen (BEL) before 2017 draws to a close, the action resumes in 2018 with the last four legs in Leipzig (GER), Zurich (SUI), Bordeaux (FRA) and then Gothenburg (SWE). The Swedish city has hosted many finals including the inaugural edition in 1979 when Austria's Hugo Simon won the first of his three titles. But the only time the Final was previously staged in Paris it was an American who came out on top, Katharine Burdsall steering The Natural to victory ahead of French rider Philippe Rozier, then aged just 24, who would go on to be part of that gold medal winning side at the Rio 2016 Olympic Games 29 years later.

Every season new talent shines throughout the qualifying rounds and last year Italy's Alberto Zorzi announced his very definite arrival at the top end of the sport with victory in Oslo. The 28-year-old was lying 109th in the Longines rankings at the time, but put himself very firmly on the map by pinning German ace, and three-time FEI World Cup™ Jumping champion, Marcus Ehning into runner-up spot despite a first-to-go draw in both rounds of the competition. He returns to the Norwegian fixture this year having relentlessly climbed up the rankings list all the way to 13th spot, and brings his winning ride, Fair Light van't Heike with him. Zorzi may well be one to watch as this new Western European League progresses.

Firsts In Jumping

The first FEI World Cup™ Jumping Final was held in Gothenburg, Sweden in 1979.
 The first winner was Austria’s Hugo Simon riding Gladstone.
 The first rider to win the series title three times was Hugo Simon who only announced his retirement from the sport recently at the age of 74.
 The first startlist consisted of 27 riders from 9 countries.
 The first woman to win the title was America’s Melanie Smith with Calypso.
 The first rider to post a double of wins was Canada’s Ian Millar, and he did it back-to-back with the same horse, the legendary Big Ben in 1989 and 1990.
 The first time the Final visited the USA was in 1980 when it was staged in Baltimore.
 The first, and only, horse-and-rider combination to win the title at three consecutive Finals was the Brazilian duo of Rodrigo Pessoa and the fabulous stallion Baloubet du Rouet who reigned supreme from 1998 to 2000.

Youngest/Oldest

The **Youngest Winning Horse** was the 7-year-old Aramis, ridden by Canada's Mario Deslauriers in Gothenburg, Sweden in 1984.

At 19 years of age Deslauriers is also the **Youngest Winning Rider**.

The **Oldest Winning Horses** were both 16-year-olds, Meredith Michaels-Beerbaum's Shutterfly (GER) in 2009 and Rich Fellers Flexible (USA) in 2012.

The **Oldest Winning Rider** is Hugo Simon (AUT) who was 54 when he won his third and last title in 1997.

FAST FACTS:

13 qualifiers staged in **10 different countries** during the Longines FEI World Cup™ Jumping 2017/2018 Western European League.

Competitions take place at **indoor** venues which add to the intensity and atmosphere of each qualifying leg.

4 riders have won the Longines FEI World Cup™ Jumping title on three occasions but only one of those posted **back-to-back wins** with the same horse - Brazil's Rodrigo Pessoa riding the brilliant stallion Baloubet du Rouet.

There have only been **five lady champions** in the history of this series and the first of those was America's Melanie Smith who came out on top with Calypso in Gothenburg (SWE) at the fourth edition in **1982**.

When Rich Fellers and the amazing stallion Flexible won the title in 2012 he was the first American to do so in 25 years.

Germany's Ludger Beerbaum, who won the title with great mare Ratina Z at Gothenburg in 1993, competed in his 21st Final in Omaha (USA) in 2017.

Switzerland's Steve Guerdat, individual Olympic champion in 2012, came out on top at the Longines FEI World Cup™ Jumping Finals in Las Vegas USA in 2015 and again in Gothenburg SWE in 2016. Each time he has ridden a different horse. He won in Las Vegas with Albufuehrens Paille and in Gothenburg with Corbinian.



There are 13 qualifying legs of Longines FEI World Cup™ Jumping Western European League, before the **Longines FEI World Cup™ Jumping Final in Paris (FRA) on 10 - 15 April 2018.**

The FEI World Cup™ Jumping series has produced many of the greatest talents ever seen in the sport, and the **Western European League has been the breeding ground of legends.**

2017 champion, America's multi-medalled McLain Ward, who won through in a classic finale on home ground in Omaha (USA), took at least 25 attempts to do it, and he didn't disguise his sheer delight when he succeeded at last.

FEI World Cup™ Jumping - world's oldest indoor Jumping series

The very first series Final took place in Gothenburg in 1979, and Austria's Hugo Simon was the first champion. Riding Gladstone, he finished ahead of America's Katie Monaghan and The Jones Boy in second place, and America's Norman dell Joio with Allegro and Ireland's Eddie Macken with Carroll's of Dundalk shared third place.

US riders claimed the trophy seven times for the first nine years of the series, but there was a 25-year gap before Rich Fellers re-claimed it in 2012 with the brilliant stallion Flexible. Beezie Madden then made it a back-to-back win for the US at the 2013 Final with Simon. Three riders have claimed the FEI World Cup™ Jumping title on three occasions, Germany's Meredith Michaels-Berberbaum and Marcus Ehning, and Rodrigo Pessoa from Brazil. Pessoa has the distinction of being the only rider to secure three back-to-back wins, and he did so with the same stallion, Baloubet du Rouet, between 1998 and 2000.
