

PROPOSALS FOR RULES CHANGES OF JUMPING RULES 2023

Introduction

Further to the approval of the FEI Periodical Rules Revision Policy at the 2019 General Assembly (available here: <u>https://inside.fei.org/fei/about-fei/governance/rules-revision-process</u>) the full revision of the Jumping Rules took place in 2021. Consequently, for this year's revision process NFs and MOU stakeholders were invited to propose only modifications that fulfilled the following criteria:

- 1. Urgent repairs, i.e., changes in the Rules that cannot await because of their impact on the welfare of the Horses or the safety of the Athletes;
- 2. Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.
- 3. New/recently introduced rule that has proven to be problematic in its implementation;
- 4. Implementation of new technology development(s) relevant to the specific set of Rules;
- 5. IOC, IPC, WADA, ASOIF and similar organisations' policies' implementation;
- 6. Other scenarios not foreseen by this Policy as considered and approved by the Board.

In addition, the FEI Headquarters and the Jumping Committee have a number of proposals put forward based also on the above mentioned criteria.

In the present document you will find 2 sections as follows:

Art. 200.6.2.1.1– Reimbursement of Travel Costs

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

2 Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.

Explanation for Proposed Change

The prices of air flights have increased enormously in the last year due to the increase in fuel prices and the fact that after the Covid many companies have reduced the number of flights and there are fewer options. In many non-European countries there are no top-level local officials, so the organizers are forced to invite some officials from Europe. For Organizing Committees, already forced in the last 2 years to a large increase in organizational costs (more costs for services veterinary, for services related to sanitary procedures, increase in the costs of all suppliers, increase in the transport costs of all materials, increase in the daily fee of all officials, increase in the prize money of the Ranking classes, increase in the minimum prize money for the categories/stars of the events, etc) the cost of the Business class has become unaffordable.

Proposed Wording

Officials should be offered a convenient travel solution, where total travel time and number of stops are minimised. Proposed travel plans must be submitted to the Official for approval before bookings are made. For non-stop flights with a duration of six or more hours, Business Class is recommended must be offered. In any case individual air travel arrangement can be made between the OC and the Official, e.g. a higher per diem for travelling Economy Class.

FEI Feedback

Art. 200 - GENERAL

Art. 200.6.2.1.5 – Per Diem (Daily Allowance) for all Officials except the Technical Delegate

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

3 New/recently introduced rule that has proven to be problematic in its implementation

Explanation for Proposed Change An increase of the per diem allowance for Officials between 25% - 108% is not a proportionate increase, especially because all travel expenses, shuttle transport, accommodation and meals are also increasing. This significant increase causes a very high financial impact on the budget for tours having a large number of Officials. The below regulation in Art. 6.2.1.5: "For Events where more than one CSI or CSIO Event is organized, the minimum per diem to be offered must be according to the highest star level at that Event" is not proportionate compared to the classes/ entry fees for Tour with several star levels. I.e., the situation at MET with the following 39 classes per week: 9 classes CSIYH* (23%) 18 classes CSI1* (46%) 12 classes CSI3* (31%) A total of 69% of the classes per week are CSI1*/YH* category. Therefore, it is not appropriate to pay for all Officials every day of the event the CSI3* per diem allowance. Tours give many Officials the opportunity to work several weeks in a row. Example MET: 21 weeks (147 days a year). There should be room for a special agreement by mutual consent with Officials getting an offer for 21 complete weeks. Beside this, it is necessary having an appropriate time frame getting new regulations in effect, to allow OCs adapting their budgets considering the high financial impact from these new rules. **Proposed Wording** N/A **FEI Feedback** The FEI accommodated a meeting for Jumping Stakeholders on 28 March 2023 where Equestrian Organisers, International Jumping Officials Club, Jumping Owners Club and International Jumping Riders Club representatives met and it was agreed not to amend this provision.

Art. 224 - FALLS

Art. 224.4.1.1 – Fall prior to starting the round

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

2 Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.

Explanation for Proposed Change

It is not logic that a fall in the practice arena is otherwise being assessed then a fall prior to starting the round. If an Athlete falls in the competition arena before starting, the same logic should be applied as for a fall in the practice arena. We propose to align the wording. There have been incidents (again) that at the entrance of the arena, due to loud music in the kick-off of a jump off, an athlete falls. If the athlete falls on the ground just before the entrance or just after, it gives a different way to solve this?

Even if an athlete is last in the class, a fall in the arena prior to starting should also still provide the possibility to start, after being checked for example using the same principle as with a fall in the warm-up.

Proposed Wording

In the event of a fall of an Athlete and/or Horse at any time prior to starting the round (see JRs Art. 226.2), the Athlete must be checked by the Event's medical service (or by a medical doctor if the medical service is not available), respectively the Horse must be cleared by the Veterinary Delegate, before the Athlete and/or the Horse may be permitted to take part in the round in progress. In this case the Ground Jury may give the Athlete a later starting position in that round if considered necessary. In case of a fall of an Athlete and/or a Horse in the practice arena prior to entering the Competition arena for a jump-off, the Ground Jury may, at its discretion, decide to delay the jump-off for a reasonable amount of time for the Athlete to be checked by the Event's medical service (or by a medical doctor if the medical service is not available), respectively the Horse to be cleared by the Veterinary Delegate, or to eliminate the combination from the jump-off.

Art. 233 – STOPPING DURING THE ROUND

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

1 Urgent repairs, i.e., changes in the Rules that cannot await because of their impact on the welfare of the Horses or the safety of the Athletes

Explanation for Proposed Change

CURRENT SITUATION

When an unforeseen incident happens during a course, the rider is stopped and needs to restart where he/she has been stopped after the bell has rung.

ISSUE

- Recently, some groups of activists have been intervening in the competition arena while a round is in progress on numerous occasions. This results in riders being stopped and having to leave the arena for quite some time. According to the rules, they have to restart their class where they were stopped.
- This means that riders have to restart eg at a triple combination, or a difficult wall, ...
- Is it fair (eg in outdoor events) to have combinations starting at a liverpool, the water jump...?
- From a horse welfare perspective and a horsemanship point of view this is not a good solution and needs to be reconsidered.
- The disadvantage that riders have because of such incidents is even made stronger by having them restart at a difficult fence.

ALTERNATIVE

Within the dressage rules, a similar "unforeseen" article is available for incidents during the Kur (eg music that stops) where the ground jury agrees with the rider where to restart the test. Marks given will not be changed (dressage rules article 420.2.2)

PROPOSAL

We have to reword the article 233 to make it more horse-friendly but at the same time guaranteeing the level playing field.

The idea should be to keep the faults that were incurred so far and have the combination restart where jury and rider agrees.

The responsibility lies with the rider and if disobediences are incurred when the restart is given, they will count. A fall will also result in elimination.

Proposed Wording

In the event of an Athlete not being able to continue their round for any reason or unforeseen circumstance, the bell should be rung to stop the Athlete. As soon as it is evident that the Athlete is stopping, the clock will be stopped. As soon as the course is ready again, the bell will be rung, and the clock will be restarted when the Athlete reaches the precise place where the clock was stopped; no penalty is incurred and six seconds are not added to the Athlete's time.

The ground jury, after consultation with the Athlete, will decide where the Athlete can start (this can be from the beginning or where the Athlete was stopped, or in between). Faults incurred before the interrupted round will count. If the Athlete decides to start on fences he already jumped, no additional jumping faults will be incurred and the time will only start where the Athlete's time was stopped. However, (additional) disobedience(s) will count and a fall of Horse and/or Athlete will incur elimination.

FEI Feedback

The Jumping Committee is not in favour of making this change as the rule has not proven to be problematic.

3 New/recently introduced rule that has proven to be problematic in its implementation

Explanation for Proposed Change

CURRENT SITUATION

The change of the Table A rules with regards to the time penalties needs evaluation. On the one hand we see it is beneficial in championships, nations cups... On the other hand we see it is not a positive evolution for the lower level classes.

ALTERNATIVE

We propose to have a split in the application, based on the height/level of the class.

3 New/recently introduced rule that has proven to be problematic in its implementation

Explanation for Proposed Change

Now all competitions under Table A of which the exceeding time has passed, are run with the following penalty: one penalty for each second commence.

We would like to see that there is difference in competitions. One penalty for each second exceeding the time should be for all the Longines Ranking competitions, Grand Prix and Nation Cup competition. For all other classes should it be like it was before. For each four seconds one penalty.

Proposed Wording

Exceeding the time allowed in all competitions run under Table A for Longines Ranking competitions, Grand Prix or Nation Cup competitions: one penalty for each second commence.

All other classes: one penalty for every four seconds commenced

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

4 Implementation of new technology development(s) relevant to the specific set of Rules

Explanation for Proposed Change

We would like to see a more clean view in score what the jumping faults are and what the faults are for exceeding the time. The time faults can be in parentheses.

Adding the penalties for faults at the obstacles and the time penalties, gives the score obtained by the athlete for their round. Time faults will be mentioned separately in the score. For example 8 (7) or 4 (2)

The FEI has recently communicated on the new requirements with regards to display of TIME and OBSTACLE faults for competitions run under Table A. Following the comments received on this matter, the below rule has been added.

Separate Penalties for Faults at the obstacles and the time Penalties, as well as the total Penalties incurred by the Athlete, must be included in the official results.

Art. 241 – ELIMINATIONS Art. 241.4

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

1 Urgent repairs, i.e., changes in the Rules that cannot await because of their impact on the welfare of the Horses or the safety of the Athletes

Explanation for Proposed Change

The IJRC believes that a broader concept (going beyond just the relatively rare case of blood in the nostrils) is needed in order to give the Ground Jury the clear authority to take action where there are serious horse welfare concerns.

- A clear definition of the cases leading to elimination is required.
- During major events a previous Olympic medalist or top rider could act as support
 official to provide advice. This would create a decision-making panel so as not to
 entrust responsibility to just one individual.

Proposed Wording

The President of the Ground Jury (or in the absence of the President of the Ground Jury from the Ground Jury box, the Ground Jury Member designated by the President of the Ground Jury to take over the running of the Competition in their absence) may, in their sole discretion, ring the bell (or instruct another Ground Jury member to ring the bell) to eliminate an Athlete/Horse combination while a round is ongoing if the President of the Ground Jury (or their designee) decides that it would be contrary to the principles of horse welfare for the safety of the horses and riders to allow the combination to continue the round.

The decision to eliminate is final and not subject to appeal or protest.

FEI Feedback

Following discussions on the newly introduced rule and taking into account the undergoing work of the EEWB Commission, the wording was reviewed and the following update is proposed.

With regards to the request to appoint a rider to act as support to the officials, such cases will require the Ground Jury President or their designee to take quick decisions "on the spot". There will be no time or possibility to consult with other parties.

FEI Proposed Wording (if applicable)

The President of the Ground Jury (or in the absence of the President of the Ground Jury from the Ground Jury box, the Ground Jury Member designated by the President of the Ground Jury to take over the running of the Competition in their absence) may, in their sole discretion, ring the bell (or instruct another Ground Jury member to ring the bell) to eliminate an Athlete/Horse combination while a round is ongoing if the President of the Ground Jury (or their designee) decides that it would be contrary to the principles of horse welfare this would be in the best interest of the wellbeing and/or safety of the Horse and/or Athlete to allow the combination to continue the round.

The decision to eliminate is final and not subject to appeal or protest.

Art. 251 – ENTRIES Art. 251.9.2

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

1 Urgent repairs, i.e., changes in the Rules that cannot await because of their impact on the welfare of the Horses or the safety of the Athletes

Explanation for Proposed Change

The possibility of substituting a horse meets sporting and horse welfare needs.

These changes of horses permit to maintain the athlete participation and do not impact the show management from the OC, as far as those substitutions are proceeded within the FEI entry system before the last date of substitution.

Not requiring extra permission aims for process simplification.

This change doesn't require an update to the general regulations: "Substitutions of Athletes and/or Horses may only be made in accordance with the relevant Sport Rules."

Proposed Wording

Following receipt of the definite entries, substitutions of Horses and/or Athletes may only be made with the express permission of the OC. The OC must print in the Schedule the latest date for substitution of Horse(s) and Athlete(s), which may not be later than the day of the Horse inspection.

Art. 251 – ENTRIES Art. 251.15

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

2 Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.

Explanation for Proposed Change

From an FEI IT perspective, NFs can make definite entries on the entry system for the same athlete to more than one event during the same week. Concerned OCs can see this information on the FEI entry system.

If needed, this allows riders to choose the event they want to compete (at the risk of having No-Show / late withdrawal penalties) in particular while they are waiting for the validation or not of an OC.

If he wishes to compete in both different events, the athlete must have the agreement of the OCs.

This process gives flexibility which is positive but does not fully comply with the current rules wording.

From an OC perspective the late withdrawal fees apply when a rider withdraws after definite entries or last date of substitutions.

Proposed Wording

An NF may not make definite entries for the same Athlete to more than one OC of Events held in the same calendar week. However, the Athlete may not compete on Penalty of disqualification of the Athlete from the Events in which the Athlete participates unless and notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the GRs both OCs concerned have given their agreement (Exception see JRs Art. 251.14). Without agreement of concerned OCs, the Athlete may be disqualified from the Events in which the Athlete participated. The Horse(s) of Athletes entered in more than one Event on the same weekend must be present at the first Horse Inspection of the respective Events (see also JRs Art. 280.2.1.1).

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

1 Urgent repairs, i.e., changes in the Rules that cannot await because of their impact on the welfare of the Horses or the safety of the Athletes

Explanation for Proposed Change

No phone use by hand for any person while on a horse at events. This is for the safety of everybody. Hands-free calling, so use of an earphone, is allowed.

Proposed Wording

Earphones and/or electronic communication devices may never be worn during FEI Jumping Competitions. For the avoidance of any doubt, Athletes, grooms or any other person may wear one earphone at any other time while mounted. No use of phone by hand while mounted.

FEI Feedback

The Jumping Committee is not in favour of this change and believe the Stewards can warn an athlete if his behaviour is unsafe.

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

1 Urgent repairs, i.e., changes in the Rules that cannot await because of their impact on the welfare of the Horses or the safety of the Athletes

Explanation for Proposed Change

The limitations that were made in the past about spurs have been very beneficial from a horse welfare perspective. In recent cases, we specifically see blood marks created by specific spurs like on the picture.

To avoid these blood marks, we propose an addition to the rules.



Proposed Wording

Anywhere within the grounds of the Event, the Athlete when mounted may wear only one spur on each boot. The branches of the spur must be smooth and blunt.

FEI Feedback

The Jumping Committee reviewed this request and agreed not to allow the use of comb spurs anymore. This is reflected in the <u>Tack Equipment Database</u> (Tack App).

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

2 Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.

Explanation for Proposed Change

Nowhere in the rules is the length of the dressage whip mentioned. It should be good to have this clarified to avoid any misinterpretation.

-

The rule currently states athletes can use a dressage whip. The IRL NF believe this needs clarification that the total length should not exceed 120cms. There is no length in the jumping Rules.

Proposed Wording

Athletes are allowed to use a dressage whip (with a maximum length of 120cm) when working on the flat but are strictly forbidden to use or carry a whip which is weighed down at the end at any time, or to carry or use one which is more than 75 centimetres in length in the arena and schooling areas when riding over poles or any obstacle. No substitute for a whip may be carried.

2 Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.

Explanation for Proposed Change

The Chief Steward cannot take over the responsibility from an athlete regarding the compliance with rules. The responsibility must remain with the athlete. Therefor we propose to remove the first sentence of this article.

Proposed Wording

The Chief Steward is responsible for ensuring that the above provisions are respected by Athletes before entering the arena. Athletes not complying with the above will not be permitted to enter the arena during competition. An official clothing approved by an NF not complying with the requirements of this article will not be authorised by the FEI.

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

1 Urgent repairs, i.e., changes in the Rules that cannot await because of their impact on the welfare of the Horses or the safety of the Athletes

Explanation for Proposed Change

Today we see nosebands which cannot be viewed as compliant with Horse Welfare. E.g metallic chains, non-smooth rope as well as hard spiky inserts. We need to ensure the future of our sport and respond.

Today's rule 257 allows the veterinary to take action but it is very rare that this happen. The acceptance of non-friendly horse tack is today a norm which needs to be better regulated.

Modify the rules regarding noseband in response to horse community and in compliance with horse welfare. A suggestion is to align with the wording used for CSICh.

Proposed Wording

Nosebands must be flat. Nosebands constructed from materials other than leather are not permitted, with the exception of the front part of the noseband which may optionally be made of flat, non-abrasive leather-like material. Sheepskin on the noseband is permitted. A small disc of sheepskin may be used in the intersection of the two leather straps of a crossed noseband.

There are no restrictions on bits or nosebands. However, The Ground Jury has the right, based on veterinary advice, to forbid the use of a bit or noseband that may cause injury to the Horse.

FEI Feedback

The review of rules around tack and equipment will have to be subject to wider consultation and is deferred to the next full revision. In the meantime, the <u>Tack Equipment Database</u> (Tack App) is regularly updated.

2 Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.

Explanation for Proposed Change

Nosebands, currently there is no restrictions on Nosebands. However, with the welfare of the horse in mind, and with Social License taken into consideration, the IRL NF believe all nosebands should be bought into line with Ponies. (Annex XI Art 21 Inspection of Saddlery Art 1.1.2 Nosebands) This will stop the use of chains and other materials.

Proposed Wording

Nosebands must be flat. Nosebands constructed from materials other than leather are not permitted, with the exception of the front part of the noseband which may optionally be made of flat, non-abrasive leather-like material. Sheepskin on the noseband is permitted. A small disc of sheepskin may be used in the intersection of the two leather straps of a crossed noseband.

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

2 Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.

Explanation for Proposed Change

Currently any hind boot that has a single Velcro Type Fastener must have a minimum width of 5cms. The IRL NF suggest that this is too wide for Ponies, and 4cms minimum width should be allowed for boots when fitted on a Pony.

Proposed Wording

The boot may have no more than two fasteners. Only the following types of fasteners are permitted:

Velcro-type fasteners:

- Each strap must:

- Have a Velcro or Velcro-type fastening system.
- Have a minimum width of 2.5 cm if there are two straps or
- Have a minimum width of 5 cm (4cms for Pony Competitions) if there is only one strap.

- For boots with a protective element only on the inside of the fetlock, straps may be elastic or non-elastic

- For double-shell boots, the straps must be elastic.

As a result, an adjustment is required that considers:

- Swiss inflation on PM set in CH.
- The proportion between the minimum and maximum entry fee and the minimum and maximum PM. Most organizers (1*-2*-3*-4*) apply the maximum Entry Fee but the minimum PM.
- Proportionality between number of starters and PM.
- That the exchange rate for PMs is set by the FEI in January, while entries fee are paid considering the exchange rate of the day set by the organizer.

The increase of the entry fee and of the costs, which are already expensive, will become unaffordable for some countries or the whole of Easter Europe, where the sport is currently undergoing promising development.

We believe that the payment of an entry fee must be standardized for all 5* events with the same amount.

It does not make sense, that Junior riders may ride six year old horses in CSI/O J classes (which may be up to 1.40m) but Young Riders and U25 riders may not ride a six year old horse in the Y / U25 classes which may be as low as 1.20m. To protect the 6 years old horses we suggest to limit the height for that age group.

Maximum height 1.50 m, with a proportional spread between 1.50 m and 1.80 m for U25 and Young Riders, except for the triple bar which may have a maximum spread of 1.90 m. Speed for the Grand Prix if it is a Longines Ranking Competition with a height of 1.45 m or more: minimum 375 m per minute, maximum 400 m per minute (see Art. 234.2) outdoors, and minimum 350 m per minute, maximum 375 m per minute indoors. Speed for other Competitions minimum 350 m per minute. In indoor arenas the speed may be reduced to 325 m per minute; the speed may also be reduced to 325 m per minute in outdoor arenas providing it is stated in the Schedule. Minimum age of Horses six seven years, providing that the maximum height for six year old horses does not exceed 1.35 m. As of the age of seven, horses may participate in all classes.

Explanation for Proposed Change

Although the new rule that ponies are no longer allowed in CSI1* and CSI2* competitions was implemented on 1.1.2022, it has shown its consequences during this year. The pony sport must be supported and especially for families with both horses and ponies it was much easier, cheaper and feasible to compete with both at the same event. These competing possibilities are missed a lot and make it much more difficult for those pony riders to get the relevant experience.

Furthermore, the riders basically already have many days of absence from school to be able to participate in (international) events. The days to be excused from school are usually limited. This in turn suggests that riders should have as many opportunities to compete as possible to make the most out of the events and not have to leave one weekend with the pony, and the next with the horse. Education is immensely important and should not be by the sport. We need to get closer to the riders and families again.

Proposed Wording

1. A Pony is a small Horse whose height at the withers, having been measured on a smooth level surface, does not exceed 1.48 m without shoes. Refer to VRs Chapter IX, Art. 1082-1088 and VRs Annex IX for complete details relating to the regulatory height of a Pony and Pony Measurement.

1.1. In order to participate in international Events and Championships for Ponies, a Pony must be registered with the FEI as a Pony. A Pony that is registered with the FEI as a Pony may not participate in CSI(O)s or Championships for any other Category.

Teams with equality of Penalties are placed according to the combined Penalties and times of their best three athletes.

10.3.2. Teams with equality of total Penalties for other places after the second round are placed according to the total Penalties of their best three Athletes in both rounds and the combined times of their best three Athletes in the second round. In case of equality of total Penalties and combined times in the second round, the teams concerned will be separated by the combined times of their three best Athletes in the first round.

<u>10.4.</u> For all CSIOCh and CSIOP the classification of teams not taking part in the second round is based on the total Penalties of the three best Athletes of each team in the first round. Teams with equality of Penalties are placed equal. The starting order of teams in the second round will be in the reverse order of the total Penalties in the first round of the best three Athletes in each team. In case of equality of Penalties the teams will retain the same starting order as in the first round. 6. At Nations Cup/Longines League of Nations[™] and Grand Prix Competitions at selected CSIOs, at FEI Jumping World Cup[™] Competitions and at CSI3*/4*/5* Grand Prix Competitions, the Foreign Judge is responsible for ensuring that the course is built to the required dimensions and will confirm to the FEI that the technical specifications have been respected. Proposed Wording

Athletes of the appropriate age may take part with a Pony in all Competitions, including the Nations Cup, at a CSIOP and with a Horse in all Competitions, including the Nations Cup, at a CSIOCh at the same venue during the same week. Athletes may not take part in the Nations Cup at a CSIOP and in the Nations Cup at a CSIOJ at the same venue on the same dates. Athletes of the appropriate age may participate, with different Ponies/Horses in Competitions other than the Nations Cup at a CSIOP and a CSIOJ at the same venue during the same week, but may only participate in one Nations Cup Competition at such Events (either at the CSIOP or the CSIOJ).
