# FEI Eventing European Championship Avenches 2021

The **FEI Eventing European Championship 2021**, which takes place in Avenches (SUI) from 23-26 September 2021, will crown the Individual and Team Eventing Champions.

This is the 35<sup>th</sup> FEI Eventing European Championship since the Championships started 68 years ago in 1953.

## Venue Information

The FEI Eventing European Championship will take place on the site of the Institut Equestre National d'Avenches (IENA) in Avenches, the first time these Championships have been hosted in Switzerland since Frauenfeld in 1983.

## Participants at the FEI Eventing European Championship

A total of **73 athlete/horse** combinations from **17 countries** will contest the medals, with 13 nations fielding teams.

**13 nations with full teams:** AUT, BEL, CZE, ESP, FRA, GER, GBR, IRL, ITA, NED, RUS, SWE, SUI

**4 nations with individuals:** DEN, FIN, LTU, POL

## Format

This is a Long Format Competition (CCI-L). As per article 502.1.2 of the FEI Eventing Rules:

*A Long Format Competition may take place over three or more days. The Dressage Test will be spread over one or more consecutive days, depending on the number of competitors, directly followed on the next day by the Cross Country Test. The Jumping Test is on the final day and is open only to horses that have been passed fit to compete at the horse inspection.*

## All You Need To Know & Fast Facts

### FEI Eventing European Championships history

The first edition of the FEI Eventing European Championship was held on the Duke of Beaufort's estate in Badminton (GBR) in 1953, at a time when Eventing was still very much associated with the military. Forty athletes participated, but no team medals were awarded as only one team finished the competition. The same situation occurred again in 1954 and 1955, when only two teams completed.

Initially held every year, since 1965 the European Championships have taken place every two years.

### Firsts:

- The first Eventing European Championship was held in Badminton in 1953
- In the first edition, 40 athletes from six nations took part
- Individual gold went to Arthur Lawrence Rook (GBR) with Starlight
- The first female Eventing athlete to claim the European title was Sheila Willcox (GBR) with High And Mighty in 1957 in Copenhagen (DEN)

### Defending Champions from 2019:

- Individual: Ingrid Klimke (GER) with SAP Hale Bob OLD, who return to defend their title
- Defending Team Champions: Germany

### Facts & Figures European Eventing

The FEI Eventing European Championship 2021 at Avenches (SUI) is the 35<sup>th</sup> since the classification began 68 years ago in 1953 and the third to be held in Switzerland after Basel (1954) and Frauenfeld (1983)

In 2015, Michael Jung, who went on to take individual silver in 2017 on FischerRocana and in 2019 on FischerChipmunk, equalled the record set by Ginny Elliot (GBR) in the 1980s of winning three successive European titles on three different horses: La Biosthetique Sam in 2011, Halunke in 2013 and FischerTakinou in 2015

Great Britain is the most successful nation in this classification, with 22 team golds; Germany has six, Russia three, Sweden two and Ireland one

Great Britain has 18 individual titles and has made a clean sweep of team gold and all three individual medals six times; Germany, which achieved the same result in 2011, has six individual titles (three of them won by Jung and two by Klimke); France has three, Ireland and Switzerland two; Poland, Denmark and Russia one

The ratio of women to men winning the individual title is 17:17

Eddy Stibbe holds the record for most European Championship appearances – 12 for the Netherlands and Dutch Antilles

Lucinda Green (GBR) was the first rider to win her title back (1975-77) on Be Fair and George

Pippa Funnell (GBR) with Supreme Rock and Ingrid Klimke (GER) SAP Hale Bob are the only athletes to have won the title back-to-back on the same horse: Supreme Rock (1999 and 2001) and SAP Hale Bob (2017 and 2019)

Nicolas Touzaint (FRA) has also won the title twice on the same horse, Galan de Sauvagere (2003 and 2007)

Mary Gordon Watson (GBR) is the youngest individual winner of a European title; she was 19 in 1969. Her horse, Cornishman V, never finished lower than fourth in any championships

Mary Gordon Watson (GBR), Ginny Elliot (GBR), Zara Phillips (GBR) and Michael Jung (GER) are the only athletes to have held World and European titles simultaneously – Jung is distinguished by combining it with the Olympic title

Only four horses have held World and European titles simultaneously: Cornishman V (Mary Gordon Watson, 1969-70); Priceless (Ginny Holgate, 1985-86); Toytown (Zara Phillips, 2005-06); La Biosthetique Sam (Michael Jung, 2010-2011). Sam is distinguished by also holding the Olympic title in 2012 (as well as in 2016)

Four horses have won four European gold medals: Kilbarry (Frank Weldon, GBR), Supreme Rock (Pippa Funnell, GBR), Over To You (Jeanette Brakewell, GBR) and Hale Bob (Ingrid Klimke) — Over To You won gold in four consecutive Europeans (1999-2005)

Princess Anne (GBR) and Zara Phillips (GBR) are the only mother/daughter to have won individual titles; Zara's father, Captain Mark Phillips, was on the winning British team in 1971.

Dr Reiner Klimke (GER), father of the 2017 and 2019 champion, Ingrid Klimke (GER), was a multi-medalled Dressage athlete

Harry and Virginia Freeman-Jackson (IRL) are the only father/daughter combination to ride on a team together, in 1959 and 1962.

Ireland also fielded the first brother/sister team, with John and Jessica Fowler in 1967 and then Jeremy and Jill Spring in 1991. Mandy and Eddy Stibbe (NED) were the first husband and wife combination (1989-91), and Jean-Yves and Thierry Touzaint (FRA), the first brothers (1975).

Sisters Linda and Sara Algotsson (SWE) regularly competed together in the Swedish team; Linda won individual silver medals in 1999 and 2003 on the home-bred Stand By Me; Sara, the 2012 Olympic silver medallist, is now married to German rider Frank Ostholt.

Nicolas Touzaint's father Jean-Yves and uncle Thierry rode in European Championships, as did Jean-Lou Bigot's father Armand; William Fox-Pitt's mother, Marietta, represented Britain in 1967; John Watson (IRL) was a member of the winning team in 1979 and his son, Sam, competed for Ireland in 2009, 2011, 2013, 2017 and 2019.

In 2009, Juan Carlos Garcia (ITA) made history by winning team silver medals in both Eventing and Jumping; Susanna Bordone (ITA) represented her country in both Eventing and Dressage.

Kristina Cook (GBR), the individual champion in 2009, and Ingrid Klimke (GER) in 2017 and 2019, are the only mothers to have won the title, although Mary King (GBR) was five months' pregnant when she won team gold and individual bronze in 1995.

The FEI is the world governing body for horse sport recognised by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) and was founded in 1921. Equestrian sport has been part of the Olympic movement since the 1912 Games in Stockholm.

The FEI is the sole controlling authority for all international events in the Olympic sports of Jumping, Dressage and Eventing, as well as Driving, Endurance, Vaulting and Reining.

The FEI became one of the first international sports governing bodies to govern and regulate global para sport alongside its seven able-bodied disciplines when Para-Equestrian Dressage joined its ranks in 2006. The FEI now governs all international competitions for Para-Equestrian Dressage and Para-Driving.
