

PROPOSALS FOR RULES CHANGES OF JUMPING RULES 2022

Introduction

Further to the approval of the FEI Periodical Rules Revision Policy at the 2019 General Assembly (available here: <https://inside.fei.org/fei/about-fei/governance/rules-revision-process>) the full revision of the Jumping Rules took place in 2021. Consequently, for this year's revision process NFs and MOU stakeholders were invited to propose only modifications that fulfilled the following criteria:

1. Urgent repairs, i.e., changes in the Rules that cannot await because of their impact on the welfare of the Horses or the safety of the Athletes;
2. Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.
3. New/recently introduced rule that has proven to be problematic in its implementation;
4. Implementation of new technology development(s) relevant to the specific set of Rules;
5. IOC, IPC, WADA, ASOIF and similar organisations' policies' implementation;
6. Other scenarios not foreseen by this Policy as considered and approved by the Board.

In addition, the FEI Headquarters and the Jumping Committee have a number of proposals put forward based also on the above mentioned criteria.

In the present document you will find 2 sections as follows:

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria
6. Other scenario Proposal has been made in the past to review but temporarily put “on hold” because of Covid restrictions.
Explanation for Proposed Change
<p>The IJOC and EO propose to have this article reviewed. This change is required in a growing professional environment and to ensure that the reimbursement of costs and “per diem” allowance is matching the raised standards and expectations towards officials.</p> <p>The proposal includes differences between level of shows and differences in responsibilities (tied also to the function and the level of the shows)</p> <p>This change is to be combined with two other important changes :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Increase of the entry fee (see separate proposal for entry fees submitted by EO) also needed to cover increased organizational costs due to inflation rates since the last increase years ago. • Creation of an evaluation system « on the field » for officials <p>The proposal includes minor changes for the lower and lowest level events and has a bigger impact for the top level events (because of responsibility, accountability and workload).</p> <p>At the same time we ask the FEI to take care of the pay-outs according to the new grid for the officials that are appointed by FEI (foreign judge and foreign steward).</p>
Proposed Wording
<p>6.2.1.1. Reimbursement of Travel Costs</p> <p>Officials should be offered a convenient travel solution, where total travel time and number of stops are minimised. Proposed travel plans must be submitted to the Official for approval before bookings are made. For non-stop flights with a duration of six or more hours, Business Class MAY be offered. In any case individual air travel arrangement can be made between the OC and the Official, e.g. a higher per diem for travelling Economy Class.</p> <p>6.2.1.5. Per Diem (Daily Allowance) for all Officials except for the Technical Delegate</p> <p>A per diem allowance according to the table below (giving the amount per day per official) must be offered to all FEI Officials during the period of the Event. This remuneration for miscellaneous costs is to be provided net after relevant (deductable) taxes (eg VAT) being borne by the OC. Direct income taxes to be borne by the Official when applicable. A per diem will be paid in addition for a maximum total of one travel day if the Official’s travel day(s) is/are different from the officiating days.</p>

For events running at the same time at the same venue, the valid per diem is the highest star level.

The amounts stated in the table are minimum amounts in Euro.

6.3. For expenses at other FEI Championships, FEI World Cup™ Finals, FEI Nations Cup™ Finals and Olympic Games see the specific rules for these Events. Expenses at Regional Championships and Regional Games are left to the discretion of the OC. For the "Per Diem" allowance, same principals according to the level of the event are applicable as in article 6.2.1.5

FEI Feedback

The Jumping Committee has studied the proposal and is in favour of making some changes and finding a solution within the timeframe of the rule revision process for 2023. The Committee acknowledges the fact that this request had been made during the latest full revision process and that it had been postponed due to the financial context that followed the Covid-19 pandemic. Given these changes could however affect several stakeholders (i.e. athletes and owners), the Jumping Committee therefore suggests to have a wider consultation with a group of representatives in order to find an agreement on the exact changes to be presented before and voted at the General Assembly.

3. New/recently introduced rule that has proven to be problematic in its implementation

Explanation for Proposed Change

There is no reason to not authorize placing poles in the schooling area, if there is enough space and if the other riders are not disturbed.

Proposed Wording

Poles on the ground as described above may ~~not~~ be used during the warm-up for a competition if the schooling area is large enough and if the other riders are not disturbed.

FEI Feedback

The Jumping Committee is not in favour of going back to the previous wording. This new rule has been successfully implemented and it would be challenging to define in which circumstances poles on the ground would be allowed or not.

Explanation for Proposed Change

Proposed Wording

Any obstacles ~~higher than~~ 1.30 m ~~or higher~~ must have a minimum of two poles on the take-off side of the obstacle, regardless of whether or not a ground line is used. The lower pole must always be below 1.30 m. One end of the lower pole of a practice obstacle must be in a cup. The other end may rest on the ground.

FEI Feedback

The Jumping Committee is not in favour of making this change as stating "higher than" does not include 1.30m. It is therefore preferred to keep "1.30 m or higher".

Art. 224.2 Fall in the practice arena

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

2. Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.

Explanation for Proposed Change

It is not logic that a fall in the practice arena is otherwise being assessed then a fall prior to starting the round. If an Athlete falls in the competition arena before starting, the same logic should be applied as for a fall in the practice arena. We propose to align the wording.

Proposed Wording

Refer to Art. 224.4.1.1 Fall prior to starting the round
In the event of a fall of an Athlete and/or Horse at any time prior to starting the round (see JRs Art. 226.2), the combination is not eliminated but will not be permitted to start in the round in question; in this case the combination shall be listed in the results as "did not start" in that round. If the Athlete has entered more than one Horse in the Competition concerned, they must be checked by the Event's medical service (or by a medical doctor if the medical service is not available) before they can be permitted to take part in the round in progress with their other Horse(s). In this case the Ground Jury may give the Athlete a later starting position if considered necessary. The Horse must be cleared by the Veterinary Delegate, before it may be permitted to take part in the next round or Competition at the Event.

FEI Feedback

This ruling was implemented to be in line with the recommendation of the Medical Technical Committee and the Jumping Committee is therefore not in favour of changing it.

3. New/recently introduced rule that has proven to be problematic in its implementation

Explanation for Proposed Change

There have only been two months of application of this new regulations.
 Concerning the time faults per second, there is currently no idea of how this will affect the competitions. By indicating this here, we kindly ask for the possibility to evaluate this rule.

The Jumping Committee is not in favour of going back to the previous wording. In their opinion this new rule works well if the courses are measured correctly. Athletes and Officials must be given time to adapt to this new rule. The Jumping Committee however proposes a change to Art. 234 (SPEED) to reduce the minimum speed in competitions.

FEI Proposed Wording (if applicable)

Art. 234 SPEED

1. The speeds for international Competitions are as follows:

1.1. ~~350~~ 325 m per minute minimum and 400 m per minute maximum. ~~In indoor arenas the speed may be reduced to 325 m per minute; the speed may also be reduced to 325 m per minute in outdoor arenas providing it is stated in the Schedule.~~

1.2. Puissance / Power and Skill Competitions: no minimum speed required.

1.3. Longines Ranking Competitions counting for Longines Ranking point groups AA through D at CSIs and CSIOs: 375 m per minute minimum and 400 m per minute maximum outdoors and 350 m per minute minimum indoors. In outdoor arenas measuring 65 m x 85 m or smaller the speed may be reduced to 350 m per minute.

1.4. Longines Ranking Competitions counting for Longines Ranking point groups E at CSIs and CSIOs: 350 m per minute minimum and 400 m per minute maximum.

1.4.5. Nations Cup: 400 m per minute for 5* and 4* Nations Cup Competitions outdoors; 375 m per minute for 3* and 2* Nations Cup Competitions outdoors, 350 m per minute for 1* Nations Cup Competitions outdoors and also for all indoor Nations Cup Competitions.

1.5-6. Young Horse Competitions: 325 m per minute minimum.

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

1. Urgent repairs

Explanation for Proposed Change

It appears that bleeding from one or two nostrils is not covered in current regulations. This was obvious at the last Olympics in Tokyo when an Athlete fulfilled the jumping course despite heavy nose bleeding from the horse and should of course had been stopped by the Judge during the ride and eliminated since the horse was clearly unfit to continue the competition (if a regulation had been in place).

Nose blood can occur from bleeding in upper and/or lower airways (in racing horses not unusual with even lung bleeding, Exercise Induced Pulmonary Haemorrhage, EIPH, but usually after exercise).

To distinguish from a suspected minor bleeding due to a small laceration of a nostril, the horse should be checked by an FEI Veterinarian after the ride.

Nose blood should be a reason for elimination because of the impact on Horse welfare, but also for general perception, i.e., Social License to Operate (SLO).

Proposed Wording

3.32. Horses bleeding from nostril (airways) will result in Elimination.

FEI Feedback

The Jumping Committee understands the rationale behind this proposed change. However, the Jumping Committee believes that a broader concept (going beyond just the relatively rare care of blood in the nostrils) is needed in order to give the Ground Jury the clear authority to take action where there are serious horse welfare concerns. See below the suggested addition to Article 241.

If this rule change is approved at the FEI GA 2022, the FEI would ensure that Officials are trained and educated regarding this new rule so that they know when it would be appropriate to exercise this authority

Art. 241 ELIMINATIONS

4. The President of the Ground Jury (or in the absence of the President of the Ground Jury from the Ground Jury box, the Ground Jury Member designated by the President of the Ground Jury to take over the running of the Competition in their absence) may, in their sole discretion, ring the bell (or instruct another Ground Jury member to ring the bell) to eliminate an Athlete/Horse combination while a round is ongoing if the President of the Ground Jury (or their designee) decides that it would be contrary to the principles of horse welfare to allow the combination to continue the round. The decision to eliminate is final and not subject to appeal or protest.

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

1. Urgent repairs

Explanation for Proposed Change

Our social license and the welfare of the horse should be our priority. With that in mind we propose the following adjustment:
 Blood on the horse's flanks, mouth or nose should always lead to Elimination. The chances of a nose bleed being a symptom of pulmonary haemorrhage is too big to ignore and should be checked by a veterinary. **This rule should also be added to the rules of all the other disciplines.**

Proposed Wording

3.30. blood on the Horse's flank(s), **Horses bleeding in the mouth, Horses bleeding in the nose**

(Combining 3.30 and 3.31 and adding nose bleed and remove the line: *in minor cases of blood in the mouth, such as where a Horse appears to have bitten its tongue or lip, Officials may authorize the rinsing or wiping of the mouth and allow the Athlete to continue.*)

Explanation for Proposed Change

Winning a prize has to be expanded (exact wording to be defined) as some athletes maybe just want to complete the class and to take part at the Grand Prix, sometime the Longines Ranking points are for athletes which are not the Prizes.

2. Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.
Explanation for Proposed Change
Shows are not limited to "weekend" events and therefore we propose to change the wording.
Proposed Wording
The Schedule must specify the number of Horses allowed for each Athlete at CSIOs and CSIs but this number must be limited to a maximum of three. At Shows where several Events of different Categories are organised on the same weekend dates the number of Horses per Athlete must be limited to three per CSI Category. [...] At stand-alone CSIYH Events, that is CSIYH Events that are not organised concurrently with another CSI at the same venue on the same weekend dates , Athletes may enter three Horses per YH age category.

The Jumping Committee is not in favour of amending this wording as it has caused no problems in the past.

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria
1. Urgent repairs
Explanation for Proposed Change
For ponies and children there are more strict rules concerning nosebands. For consistency and for horse welfare we propose to align the rules for all categories.
Proposed Wording
There are no restrictions on bits or nosebands . However, the Ground Jury has the right, based on veterinary advice, to forbid the use of a bit or noseband that may cause injury to the Horse. Nosebands must be flat. Nosebands constructed from materials other than leather are not permitted, with the exception of the front part of the noseband which may optionally be made of flat, non-abrasive synthetic leather-like material. Sheepskin on the noseband is permitted. A small disc of sheepskin may be used in the intersection of the two leather straps of a crossed noseband.
FEI Feedback
This rule was introduced for Children and Pony Riders as they are considered to be less experienced riders. The Jumping Committee is therefore not in favour of going back to the previous wording.

CSIOJ and CSIOYR paragraph 10.3 says: The placing of teams after the second round is according to paragraph 9.2 (first sentence) above. - Not against the clock, but paragraph 10.3.2 makes reference to 9.2.2 which is Against the clock.

The Jumping Committee is in favour of making a clarification with regards to the articles mentioned above.

10.3. For all CSIOY and CSIOJ, the classification of teams not taking part in the second round is according to paragraph 9.1 above. The placing of teams after the second round is according to paragraph 9.2 ~~(first sentence)~~and 9.2.2 above. For all CSIOCh and CSIOP the classification of teams not taking part in the second round is based on the total Penalties of the three best Athletes of each team in the first round. Teams with equality of Penalties are placed equal. The starting order of teams in the second round will be in the reverse order of the total Penalties in the first round of the best three Athletes in each team. In case of equality of Penalties the teams will retain the same starting order as in the first round. Placing of teams after the second round is according to paragraph 9.2 ~~(first sentence)~~and 9.2.2 above.

Section 6 – General

Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria

3. New/recently introduced rule that has proven to be problematic in its implementation

Explanation for Proposed Change

If an OC can fill up empty stables, this prevents a financial loss. Until last year, additional competitors could be invited under the condition that a qualifier for the Grand Prix was scheduled. In light of this, the rules were revised so that OCs are allowed to invite additional Athletes, but without the right to participate in Longines Ranking competitions, if the maximum number of Horses allowed to be entered has not been reached at the closing date of entries.

Unfortunately, the new rule means that those who can enter at this stage do not have the chance to qualify for Longines Ranking competitions, which in general are the competitions with higher prize-money.

It should be ensured that the OC can decide which Athlete shall be the replacement for an Athlete who was admitted via the “normal” quota (an entry system issue). That way, an Athlete who initially had a “filling stables up” invitation can be the replacement for a “normal” invitation and thus does have the right to participate in Longines Ranking competitions.

Or, if the above is a consequence that was not wanted or was underestimated, we should return to the previous wording of the 2021 rules.

The Jumping Committee acknowledges that this newly introduced rule has proven to be problematic in its implementation and has decided to amend the wording to give athletes who are invited in addition to the normal quota to fill up the stables will be allowed to take part in Longines Ranking competitions.

Explanation for Proposed Change

Riders who are not allowed to participate in Longines ranking classes are not interested in going to a CSI2* or CSI3*, ie, organizers will be left with empty stables, and will lose money. This new rule is not fair for the organizers and has important financial consequences for some organizers.

Proposed Wording

OCs will be permitted to invite a limited number of additional Athletes ~~without the right to participate in Competitions counting for the Longines Ranking~~ if, at the closing of entries, the maximum number of Horses that may be entered has not been reached. Any Athlete so invited is ineligible to participate in all Longines Ranking Competitions at the Event, ~~including if the Athlete will have qualified for a Longines Ranking Competition through one or more non-Longines Ranking Competition(s). Any Athlete so invited whose name appears in the results of a Longines Ranking Competition will earn no Longines Ranking points and will be disqualified retroactively from the Competition. If the Grand Prix, or the Competition with the highest prize money of the Event, if it is not the Grand Prix, is not a Longines Ranking Competition (e.g. if at a FEI JUMPING RULES, 27th edition, effective 1 January 2022 ANNEX V 74 CSI2* the prize money offered for the Grand Prix does not meet the minimum required for a Longines Ranking Competition),~~ and no qualification system for the Grand Prix or Competition with the highest prize money is foreseen in the Schedule, the OC may not invite such additional Athletes in excess of the maximum number of starters allowed to take part in the Competition concerned as established in the Schedule. These additional Athletes are not taken into consideration for the calculation of the percentages of Athletes to be invited under Sections 1-3

ANNEX VI – CSI/CSIO REQUIREMENTS 1. CSI REQUIREMENTS WORLDWIDE
Periodical Rules Revision Policy Criteria
2. Correction of inconsistencies, manifest errors, contradictions, etc.
Explanation for Proposed Change
OCs do not understand why it can be possible to include a Youngster Tour for example in a CSI3* and the prize-money can be included in the overall amount to establish the star level of the Event, whereas if for example a CSI3* and a CSIAm is scheduled it is not possible. Decisive should be if additional athletes are invited for a Youngster Tour or not.
Proposed Wording
Prize money cannot be cumulated from multiple Events held at the same venue during the same week to establish star level. CSI-5* maximum duration is 5 days. Events at same venue over several weekends are considered separate CSIs. For these Events, the star level of the Event will be determined by the combined prize money of maximum 12 Competitions per Event, instead of the overall prize money per Event. For CSIYH Events held in connection with other CSI or CSIO Events, the following applies with regard to calculation of prize money to determine the star level of the CSI/CSIO: For stand-alone Events (e.g. CSI5* or CSIO3*) where only Athletes entered for the CSI or CSIO may participate in the YH Competitions, the prize money for the CSIYH is included in the overall amount to establish the star level of the Event; in this case it is not necessary to organise a separate CSIYH. Refer to Art. 254.2 for the number of Horses per Athlete. For stand-alone Events (e.g. CSI5* or CSIO3*) where additional Athletes are invited to participate in the YH Competitions, a separate CSIYH must be organised for the Young Horse Competitions and the prize money for the CSIYH is not included in the overall amount to establish the star level of the Event; the OC has the option to organise be a combined CSIYH with two or more age categories or separate CSIYH for each age category. Refer to Art. 254.2 for the number of Horses per Athlete. Athletes who are invited in addition to the normal quota to fill up the stables will be allowed to take part in Longines Ranking competitions.

Proposed Wording

For all other Events including CSIOs definite entries must be made within the deadlines indicated below; other deadlines for NFs to indicate their intent to participate may be requested by the NF/OC in the Schedule.

Definite entries must be made by the date mentioned in the Schedule. This date may not be earlier than four weeks prior to the beginning of the Event and later than four days preceding the beginning of the Event. These represent the final selection of Athletes and Horses that will travel to the Event. The definite entries may not exceed the number listed and represent the final selection of Athletes and Horses that may participate in the Event, except if the maximum number of Horses that may be entered (based on the number of Athletes invited multiplied by the number of Horses allowed per Athlete) has not been reached at the closing of entries, the OC may invite additional Athletes, ~~without the right to participate in Longines Ranking Competitions. Any Athlete so invited is ineligible to participate in all Longines Ranking Competitions at the Event, including if the Athlete will have qualified for a Longines Ranking Competition through one or more non-Longines Ranking Competition(s). Any Athlete so invited whose name appears in the results of a Longines Ranking Competition will earn no Longines Ranking points and will be disqualified retroactively from the Competition. If the Grand Prix or Competition with the highest prize money of the Event, if it is not the Grand Prix, is not a Longines Ranking Competition, and~~ no qualification system for the Grand Prix or Competition with the highest prize money is foreseen in the Schedule, the OC may not invite such additional Athletes in excess of the maximum number of starters allowed to take part in the Competition concerned as established in the Schedule. This change had been implemented following some discussions which had taken place several years ago and had been deferred to the latest full revision. As many manufacturers

already have jackets with piping at other places than around the collar, this newly introduced rule has proven to be problematic in its implementation and the Jumping Committee is in favour of taking the added wording out.

Proposed Wording

Art. 256.1.5 Civilians are required to wear the uniform or clothing approved by their NF, a jacket, white or light fawn breeches, black or brown boots. Other dark coloured boots may be approved at the discretion of the FEI; boots may have one contrasting colour only, around the top, heel and/or toe. Boots must have a heel. Shirts may have long or short sleeves and must have a white collar; long-sleeved shirts must have white cuffs. A white tie or choker must be worn. If a jacket is not worn (refer to Art. 256.1.3 for exceptions due to weather), shirts must have sleeves; either short or long sleeves are permitted.

The additional FEI invitation for Athletes attempting to earn a Certificate of Capability for the Olympic Games is not included in the overall quota of Athletes invited at the Event. This Athlete will be allowed to participate in all Competitions in addition to the number of Starters allowed providing the Athlete fulfils any qualification or participation requirement (for example, if the competition is a Grand Prix, providing the Athlete has completed, with their Grand Prix Horse, the initial round of at least one FEI Competition (according to Art. 261.4.4) prior to the Grand Prix). ~~The FEI invitations are included in the quota for compulsory invitations established under Section~~

~~1.1. The level of the nominated athlete must be of the required standard for the Event in question. OCs must accept the entries of Athletes to whom the FEI has allocated an FEI invitation.~~

2. ~~For the Olympic Games, Athletes/Horses must achieve the minimum eligibility requirements (MER) between 1 January of the year preceding the Olympic Games until the closing date for nominated entries, or a date established by the FEI.~~ Refer to the FEI Regulations for Equestrian Events at Olympic Games for the qualification procedure for the Olympic Games.

3.8. For the avoidance of doubt, Athletes and Horses that need to achieve a minimum score in the first round of more than one Grand Prix, FEI World Cup™ or in the first or second round of more than one Nations Cup Competition at selected CSI3*, CSI1*/2*/3*-W / CSIO1*/2*/3*-W or CSIO3* and CSIO4* Events in order to earn a Certificate of Capability (paragraphs 3.5.1 and 3.3.6.1 above) may count the results obtained in the respective Grand Prix/FEI World Cup™ Competition towards the overall total of minimum results required. Qualified to participate in the second round of the Individual Final are the 15 best placed Athletes (including those placed equal for 15th place) of each Category.

Qualified to participate are the top 60% of the Athletes (including those ~~placed equal~~^{ied} for the last qualification place) according to the cumulative Penalties over the first and the second Competitions, providing 60% of the Athletes is not more than 30 Athletes. The number of Athletes permitted to participate must not be less than 15, unless 60% of the Athletes is less than 15, and not more than 30. However, all Athletes with equal Penalties for the last qualification place are allowed to participate in the Individual Final even if the number of starters would then be more than 30.

[...]

7.3 If the Championship is held ~~during concurrently with~~ a CSI the OC may allow the Athletes participating in the Championship to take part with different Ponies in the Competitions of the CSI. The Ponies to be ridden in the Championship must, however, be declared before arrival at the Event and may not be substituted.

[...]

13.2. Team Athletes not completing the first or second round receive 20 Penalties more than the worst placed team Athlete who has finished that particular round. If the Athlete concerned had obtained more Penalties before being eliminated or retiring than the worst placed team Athlete having completed the Competition, 20 Penalties will be added to the number of Penalties they had obtained at the time of being eliminated or retiring.

[...]

13.5. In addition to the team classification there will be an individual classification with prizes for ~~this-the~~ second Competition.

14.2. In case of equality of Penalties for the first, second and/or third place a jump-off, against the clock, is compulsory. If two jump-offs are required, the jump-off for the third place shall precede the jump-off for the first ~~and second~~ place. In case of further equality of Penalties and time, the Athletes will be placed equal.

3.5 Number of teams in the second round

The second round is only open to the ten best teams following the first qualifying Competition and the first round of the Team Competition and those teams ~~placed equal~~ tied on Penalties for 10th place.

4.2.1. Running

This Competition consists of two rounds A and B, each judged under Table A, not against the clock, with a speed of 350 m per minute.

Qualified to participate are the top 60% of Athletes (including those ~~placed equal tied~~ for the last qualifying place) according to the cumulative Penalties over the first and second qualifying Competitions, providing 60% of the Athletes is not more than 30 Athletes.
