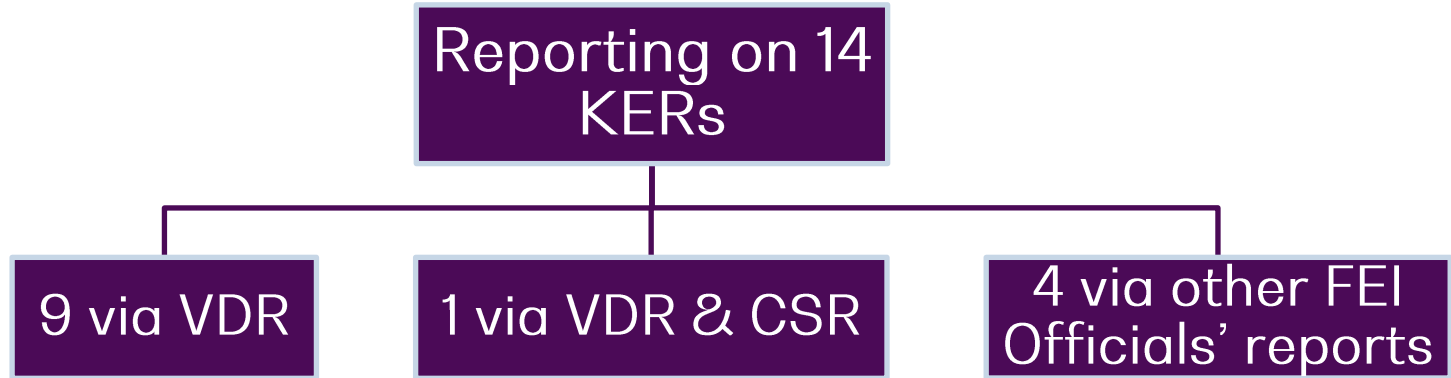
Article 1007 Veterinary Services

1. The provision of veterinary services must be organised by the VSM, supported by the OC and supervised by the VC/VD. The VSM or a TV must be available during the On-Site Preparation Period and present on the Event venue during the Horse arrival times.
2. The following veterinary services must be available for all Horses at all times during Events:
 - a) effective communication method(s) for all VDs and the team of PTVs including, a radio and mobile phones for backup;
 - b) an equine referral clinic with diagnostic imaging, endoscopy and surgical facilities must be pre-notified and on standby to receive sick or injured Horses;
 - c) at least one TV must be appointed for every 200 horses at the venue;
 - d) at least one PTV available 24 hours a day;
 - e) at least one PTV adjacent to the Competition area during all competitions and prize giving ceremonies;
 - f) at least one PTV present during all training times;
 - g) a qualified and experienced farrier;
 - h) veterinary equipment (e.g. medication and euthanasia agents, intravenous fluids, consumables and limb stabilisation equipment);

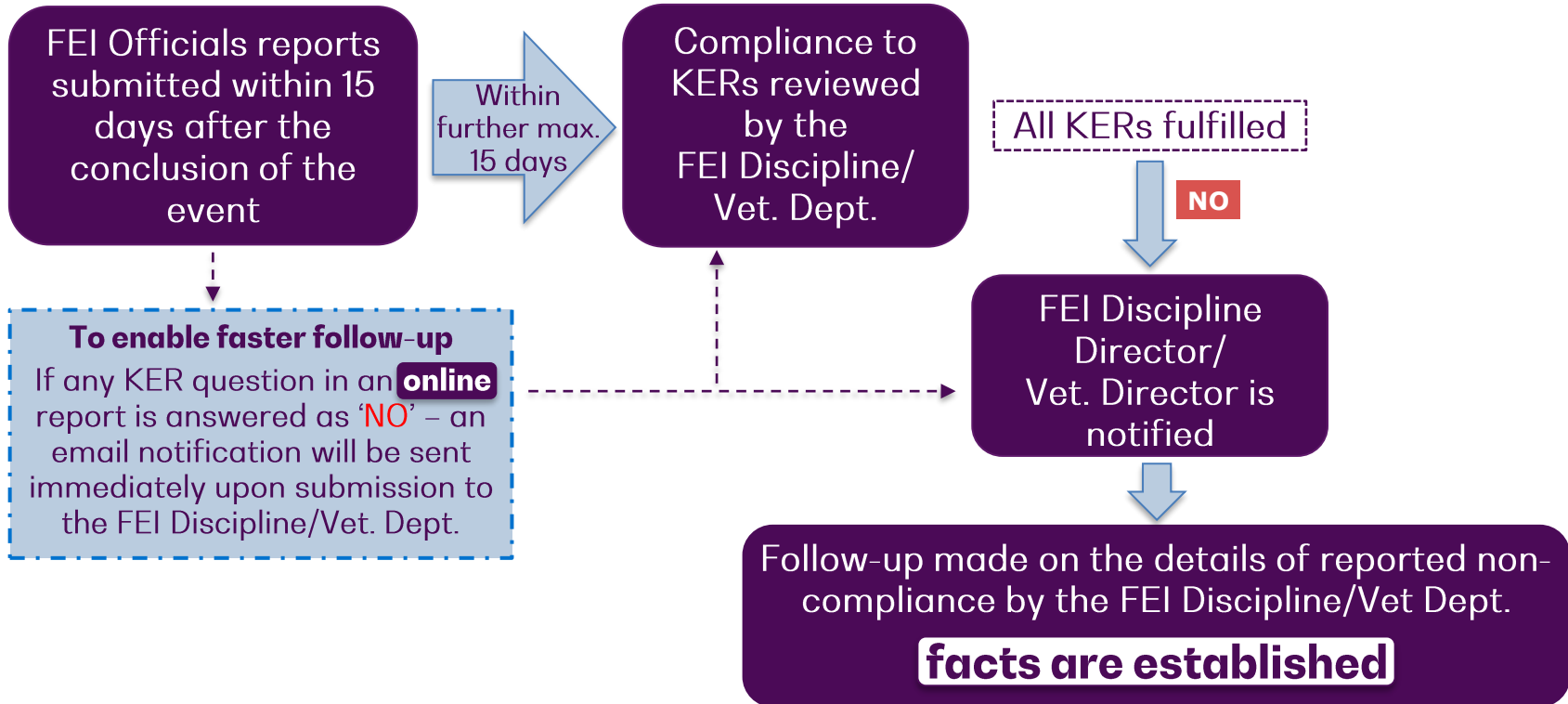
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Addressing Non-compliance

Formal communication is made to the OC highlighting the unfulfillment of one or more KERs; will include points such as:

- Were you aware about this issue (quoting regulation(s) to the KERs)?
- Should this issue not be resolved, there is a risk of not being accepted in next year's calendar (quoting FEI GRs Articles 109.13.1 and 112.3)

KERs will be added as an Annex to the FEI GRs; reference to the KERs Annex will be added to FEI GRs 109.13.1 and 112.3 that govern event cancellation and FEI calendar management respectively.

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Using an FEI provided template, OC to submit a **'formal commitment'** to resolve the issue(s) and support it with a clear plan including timelines. This will include language such as:

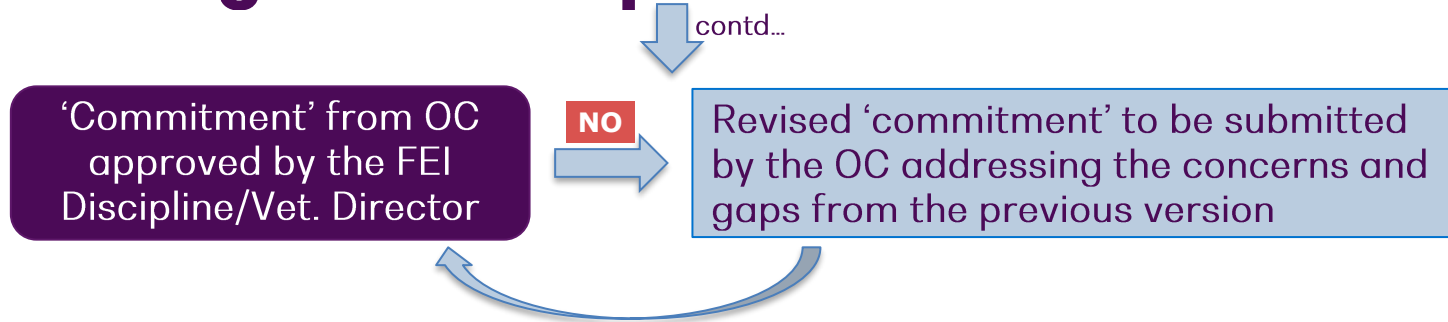
- OC commits to implement the stated plan before the next running of the event.

Next steps

- Ongoing follow-up with relevant TCs on the rules revisions proposed, ensuring that these are included for NF feedback by 28 June 2023 deadline
 - July-October, follow-up during rules process
- August-December: Communication and education about the KER system for Organisers, FEI Officials and FEI Discipline and Veterinary Dept. Reports Administrators
- Rules revisions voted on at the GA 2023
- **Launch of the KER system from 1 Jan 2024**

Other event delivery aspects

Other event aspects considered through event standards consultations have been/will be addressed in due course, with guidelines, promotion of best practice, and education.

Facilities, Services & Conditions for Grooms

Section on Grooms' services included in the FEI Event Organiser Guidelines

Grooms Accommodation

In many cases Grooms will stay in their Horse lorries/transporters. In this instance ideally parking for these should be as close as possible to the stables with electric hook-ups made available.

If accommodation is provided this should preferably be on a single occupancy basis unless Grooms are given the opportunity to share with friends/colleagues/fellow team Grooms. If this accommodation is not on or very near to the venue then the Organiser should provide shuttle transport operating throughout the stables opening period each day.

Toilet & Shower Facilities

Sufficient, clean and well-maintained toilets must be provided, as should showers when Grooms are staying on-site. These facilities should be close to the stables area and/or lorry parking as appropriate.

Catering

Food for Grooms must be readily available, healthy (eg. including salads) and varied, with any meal service being at appropriate times according to the show/competition timetable ie. not only during key competitions. Food, including 'grab and go' meal options and snacks, should be available close to the stables areas. If possible Organisers should consider providing food free of charge for Grooms. However if this is not possible at least provision of water and tea/coffee is strongly encouraged.

If the tap water is drinkable, provision can be made for cups or refillable bottles and efforts made to ensure the Grooms are aware the water is safe to drink.

Accessibility at Events

Launch of the new FEI Accessibility Handbook for Event Organisers



General Accessibility Considerations

The key to the success of any accessibility initiative is to ensure that people with disabilities have the necessary access to participate in and enjoy sports Events.

While accessibility considerations for sports Events are often focused on the athlete, it is also important that other stakeholder groups are also be taken into account at every stage of the planning, organisational and implementation phases. People with physical disabilities can be part of an athlete's entourage, and failure to provide for them can result in significant barriers to participation.

It is important to consider accessibility from the start and to see which Event aspects are impacted. It takes more time and effort to fix accessibility issues once an Event is up and running. When accessibility is incorporated at the start of the process, and a fully accessible venue is considered from the start, Organising Committees can optimise results and minimise the resources needed.

Accessibility Consultants

- Consideration should be given to involving a Disability Access Consultant who is trained to identify potential accessibility issues – preferably from lived experience – and who can advise on best practice of national legal obligations at the early stages of the Event planning process.
- It is also important to have one person on the Organising team responsible for championing accessibility and who can react quickly to any issues affecting people with disabilities during the Event.

Event Accessibility Checklist

Event Communications

Making the commitment to openly communicate about accessibility is the first step in ensuring that people with disabilities feel welcome at Events.

Event venue / Field of Play considerations

Venue accessibility is key to making the equestrian sporting experience inclusive to everyone attending and working at the Event. It is important that the Organising Committee tests alternate routes, physical infrastructure and other accessible services prior to the start of the Event. As the accessibility requirements may be slightly different from one host nation to another, it is important that Organisers research local and national regulations at the start of the planning process.

- **Cabling**
 - Cable bridges at Events can sometimes be too high for a wheelchair to pass over easily. Lower cable bridges or longer ramps should be considered to allow for better wheelchair accessibility.
 - If this is not possible, an alternate, barrier free route must be clearly indicated and tested for practicality and efficiency prior to the start of the Event.
 - In the case of indoor venues and where possible, consideration could be given to running cables through the ceiling to allow for unobstructed pathways for people with reduced mobility.
- **Parking Spaces**
 - On average there should be around one disabled parking space for every 10 regular parking positions.
 - Parking should be located close to the key entrances to the venue.
- **Signage**
 - Graphic elements comply with accessibility standards in terms of colour contrast, size of letters, position of signs etc.
 - Wayfinding signage complies with accessibility standards such as the use of international symbols, use of Braille and raised lettering, glare free, high contrast, Arabic numerals and sans serif lettering.
 - Wayfinding signage to highlight accessible pathways and service.
- **Sport & Media Areas**
 - Accessible criteria, including all connecting pathways, are met for all athlete areas: locker rooms, warm-up areas, field of play, mixed zone, doping control, medal presentation, press conference, athletes lounge, seating areas.
 - Adequate accessible seating (with necessary shade) is available for athletes, team officials, press attaches, members of the press.
 - All briefing areas must be large enough to accommodate a wheelchair and have a ramp to enter the room.
