

Longines League of NationsTM

The Longines League of Nations[™] (LLN) is an exciting new chapter in the history of the Nations Cup, equestrian sport's oldest and most prestigious series which as a concept - the nation vs nation competition- has existed since 1909!

Launched in 2024, the Longines League of Nations™ represents the best of equestrian sport featuring a unified and global format, unique to the series, where the top 10 nations compete at 4 qualifiers In Abu Dhabi (UAE), Ocala (USA), Rotterdam (NED) and St Tropez Gassin (FRA) in order to secure their spot at the Final in Barcelona (ESP), where the best 8



teams go head-to-head for the highly coveted Longines League of Nations™ Trophy!

In short, it's the best 10 teams, competing over 4 qualifiers, with the top 8 teams from the qualifiers competing in 1 Final.

Qualification of Teams

The winner of the LLN Final of the preceding LLN Season will be automatically qualified for the LLN of the following season regardless of that NF's ranking in the relevant **Qualification Ranking** and the remaining nine places will be allocated to the nine best ranked teams in the Qualification Ranking (excluding the LLN Final winner).

Competition Format

The LLN Competition is run over two rounds, with identical courses. Both rounds are run according to Table A against the clock.

The starting order of the first round of the first LLN Competition of the Season will be the reverse order of the Qualification Ranking for the LLN Series; the winner of the LLN Final of the preceding LLN Season (if eligible to participate in the LLN Season) will go last. For the subsequent LLN Competitions, the starting order of the first round will be the reverse order of the LLN Standings established after the previous LLN Competition. In case of a tie between NFs in the Qualification Ranking or LLN Standings a draw for the NFs concerned will determine their starting order.

The inaugural qualifier of the Longines League of Nations™ 2025 will be held in Abu Dhabi (UAE) on 15 February. Abu Dhabi is the capital city of the United Arab Emirates and the capital of the Emirate of Abu Dhabi. It is home to an estimated population of 1.5 million.



The Longines League of Nations[™] qualifier will be held at the Al Forsan International Sports Resort, a world leading sports, fitness, leisure and entertainment destination. The Resort, which opened in 2010, occupies 1.6km² and is conveniently located 15-minutes away from the Abu Dhabi International Airport and the Abu Dhabi National Exhibition Centre.

LLN Abu Dhabi Preview

Teams announced for the Longines League of Nations™ in Abu Dhabi (UAE)



Following the immense success of the inaugural series of the Longines League of Nations™ 2024, it returns under the same format for 2025 and promises to deliver top class sport as the world's top ten Jumping nations battle for supremacy across three continents.

As in 2024, the 2025 Longines League of Nations™ series gets underway in Abu Dhabi (UAE) at the impressive Al Forsan International Sports Resort on 15 February 2025.



Ireland, France, USA, Great Britain, Germany, Belgium, Switzerland, Netherlands, Sweden and Italy have all gained eligibility to participate in the 2025 edition of the Longines League of Nations™ as the top ten ranked nations in the world. As winners of the Final last season, Germany had officially qualified regardless of their ranking. These ten qualified teams are joined in Abu Dhabi by the host nation, United Arab Emirates.

The series is comprised of four qualifying events each with a prize fund of €700,000 and culminates with the final in Barcelona (ESP) in October where €1,600,000 in prize money alongside lucrative bonus prizes are set to lure the 'crème de la crème' of Jumping's elite once more. From Abu Dhabi, the series jets across the Atlantic to Ocala (USA) in March, back across to Europe to Rotterdam (NED) in June before St-Tropez Gassin (FRA) plays host for the first time and becomes venue for the final qualifying leg in September. The series concludes once again in Barcelona for the second edition of the Longines League of Nations™ Final where one team will be crowned the winner.

Rankings for the Longines League of Nations™

The Longines League of Nations[™] is open to ten teams. The winning team from the previous season's Final gains automatic qualification, whist the remaining nine places are open to the nine highest ranked jumping nations in the world (disregarding the nation that is already qualified). For 2025, the ranking list that decided those ten teams was the Longines League of Nations[™] Ranking- No 14, which included results up to 31 October 2024.

Points accumulated by the six top athletes from each nation, including one U25, are combined to give each nation their total. It is this that decides a nations' ranking from which the top ten teams are eligible to compete in the Longines League of NationsTM.

Longines League of Nations™ Format

The Longines League of Nations[™] 2025 series will follow the same format as 2024, differing slightly from that of traditional Nations Cups. The competition is comprised of two full rounds of Jumping over the same course. All teams send out four athletes in round one with the best three scores counting for the team total.

The best eight teams return for round two, where they no longer have the luxury of a discard score as only three athletes from each team may jump again and every score counts. After two rounds, the team with the lowest combined score (the least faults) will be the winner.

In the event of a tie on penalties for first place after the second round, there will be a jump-off between the tying nations with just one athlete from each of those teams contesting the jump-off. There will be no jump-off for any placings beyond this. In the event of a tie for lower placings the combined time of the three athletes in the second round will determine the final standings.

Ireland's Chef d'Equipe Michael Blake has named his team for Abu Dhabi as Longines League of Nations™ newcomers Trevor Breen and Jason Foley, alongside Denis Lynch and Michael Pender. France sends out Kevin Staut, Simon Delestre, Jeanne Sadran and Alexa Ferrer.

USA will be represented by an all-female quartet of Lucy Davis Kennedy, Kaitlin Campbell, Taylor Kain and Skylar Wireman lead by Chef d'Equipe Robert Ridland. Otto Becker has put his faith in Katrin Eckermann, Sophie Hinners, Jörne Sprehe and Maximilian Weishaupt to spearhead the 2025 campaign for the reining Longines League of Nations™ Champions, Germany.

Di Lampard's Paris Olympic Team Gold Medallists Great Britain are represented by Tim Gredley, Joseph Stockdale, Donald Whitaker and Robert Murphy, whilst Peter Weinberg relies upon Rik Hemeryck, Thibeau Spits, Jos Verlooy and Wilm Vermeir to get Belgium off to a flying start. Young Chef d'Equipe Peter van der Waaij has selected Team gold medallist of the FEI Jumping European Championship 2021 in Riesenbeck (GER), Bryan Balsiger alongside Romain Duguet, Janika Sprunger and Edouard Schmitz to open Switzerland's campaign.

Under their new Chef d'Equipe Wout-Jan van der Schans, runners-up in the Longines League of Nations™ Final 2024, Netherlands call upon Kevin Jochems, Tani Joosten, Leopold van Asten and Jur Vrieling to get their 2025 season off to a strong start.

Henrik Ankarcrona's reigning World and European Champions Sweden will be pinning their hopes on Rolf-Göran Bengtsson, Angelie von Essen, Angelica Augustsson Zanotelli and Petronella Andersson to build on their podium finish in the inaugural Longines League of Nations™ Final 2024 in Barcelona.


Making their debut appearance in the Longines League of Nations[™], Piergiorgio Bucci, Emanuele Camilli, Giacomo Casadei and Giulia Martinengo Marquet will fly the flag for Italy whilst Abdullah Mohd Al Marri, Omar Abdul Aziz Al Marzooqi, Abdullah Humaid Al Muhairi and Humaid Abdulla Khalifa Al Muhairi will represent the host nation UAE.

The action gets underway in Abu Dhabi from 11 to 15 February 2025 with the opening leg of the Longines League of Nations[™] being held on 15 February at the Al Forsan International Sports Resort.

What happened last year?

German giants clinch the Longines League of Nations™ crown



In a cliff-hanger of a finale to the very first Longines League of Nations[™] season, Team Germany reigned supreme at the Real Club de Polo in Barcelona, Spain today where The Netherlands finished second and Sweden pipped Ireland for third place.

It was a close-fought affair with the Germans and Dutch already out in front at the halfway stage when sharing a zero scoreline but with France, Sweden and Brazil nipping at their heels when carrying just four faults into round two.

The Irish carried eight while the USA and Spain carried 12 apiece, but the Swiss were already on the ropes with 24 first-round faults and there would be no chance of recovery. At the end of the day however they did manage to finish ahead of the French who were eliminated when anchorman Kevin Staut had an unscheduled dismount.

With the best three results from each four-member team counted in round one but just three riders returning and all scores counting in round two, it was unpredictable and thrilling once again.

"With this format you have to wait until the very end because everything can change in just a second!", Varela said. And that was exactly how it played out.

Choice

The plank on the vertical at fence nine was the bogey of the first round, with a choice of a long five or short six strides from the previous oxer. When fences were raised in round two however it was the double of verticals at fence seven on the 12-obstacle track that proved the biggest challenge.

The Germans began to look vulnerable when Andre Thieme and his 2021 European individual gold-medal-winning mare Chakaria put four faults on the board as his team's second-round pathfinders. And when compatriot and newly-crowned individual Olympic champions, Christian Kukuk and Checker, had two down then they seemed to be really losing their grip.

Maikel van der Vleuten and his Olympic double-bronze-medal-winning gelding Beauville Z N.O.P. piled on the pressure with a second clear to give the Dutch an enormous boost, but Kim Emmen and her grey gelding Imagine dropped both elements of the double at seven on the way to a 12-fault total and now, quite suddenly, the two countries were back on level pegging.

Second-last to go, Germany's Richard Vogel set off with the big-striding stallion United Touch S who looked positively regal as he soared home clear to throw it down to the final Dutch duo of Harrie Smolders and Uricas van de Kattevennen. If this pair could keep a clean sheet it would go to a jump-off because both sides would finish on a 12-fault tally. But the first pole on that bogey double at seven hit the floor to bring the Dutch tally to 16 and hand victory to Otto Becker's German side.

Strong connection

Becker has a particularly strong connection with the ring in Barcelona as this is where he rode his final Nations Cup for Germany back in 2008. "I'm proud and honoured with our win here today!", he said.

And at this evening's press conference, fourth team-member Jana Wargers said that she understood the decision to leave her and her mare Dorette OLD on the sidelines for today's second round.

"We decided that the other horses were just in a bit better shape than my one today", she explained.



Olympic champion Kukuk talked about his eight-fault second round that left Team Germany on the edge in the closing stages.

"I just had a feeling I wasn't accurate enough...I could feel that probably conditionwise he (Checker) was not on his peak right now. His last show was Paris (Olympic Games) and that's a few weeks ago. Everything was set up for that goal and then he had kind of a break after and now it's the first big show again"

He realised that Kim Emmen's 12 faults really let him off the hook.

"Unfortunately for her she had a not-so-good round and suddenly we were equal again. And then Richie had an absolutely outstanding second round and that's why we are in the end now the happy winners!", he added.

Thieme blamed himself for his single second-round error with Chakaria. After clearing the tricky double that had claimed so many previous victims, he said he was "kind of happy and relaxed because I realised that I was the first one who jumped that vertical/vertical clear at that point". But the seven strides bending to the following oxer "were just 20 centimetres too long and she had to make a really kind of a big jump, which she did very well. And then the six strides (to the vertical at fence nine) became extra, extra short and I didn't quite get her back like I did in the first round...".

He was grateful to team-mate Vogel for wrapping it up with his effortless clear.

Great day

"Today was a great day for us!", said Vogel who is ranked 10th in the world.

He is one of many riders who relies implicitly on the help of his groom who he talked about his evening. "I have to thank Felicia (Wallin). She actually had him mostly in training since Paris. We gave him a bit of time off and we did Spruce (Meadows, Canada) and then another bit of time off. So, since Spruce, I was, to be honest, not too much in his saddle and around him because I was in America. She overtook the training and clearly did a pretty good job. So, I guess we have to keep it that way now. The plan works!"

He sees Felicia as a vital member of his team. "I'm very glad to have her by my side and the horses are very happy to have her by their side. We've worked together for three and a half/four years now. We're a young team. She is 24 and I am 27 - we are heading in the same direction and we have high hopes for the future. Her and United have a very special bond. If he could pick between me and Felicia, he always goes to Felicia. Their bond is special. She rides him very well. I'm the one that does the flat work that is more educating for him, which is also important. She's the one that goes in the forest with him and gives him a happy time, which I find very important to have the right balance there. Now, since I was away for two weeks, I said not only in



the forest for two weeks, but also for work in between - and she did it very well!", he pointed out.

Special awards

Felicia and the other winning team grooms, Sofie Karlsson, Heidemarie Jaeckel, Ulla Uusitalo and Johanna Klare all received special awards at tonight's prize-giving ceremony while Ariel Grange, owner of the mare Legacy competed by Ireland's Daniel Coyle won the Best Horse title for her performances throughout this first Longines League of Nations™ series.

Coyle also took a four-way share of the €200,000 bonus on offer for the Best Individual Performances in the Final along with Germany's Vogel, The Netherlands' van der Vleuten and Armando Trapote - the latter lifting the home crowd when also posting a double-clear with Tornado VS. And Coyle was back on the presentation podium once again when joining van der Vleuten and Sweden's Henrik von Eckermann to share the Best Athlete Award. All three produced five clear rounds during the season.

The Rookie of the Season title went to America's Callie Schott and of course Chef d'Equipe of the Season was Germany's Otto Becker whose team also won the opening leg of the inaugural series in Abu Dhabi in February.

At the end of the day the Longines League of Nations™ Final 2024 scoreboard showed Sweden getting the edge over Ireland for third place based on their faster times when finishing on 20 faults. Brazil slotted into fifth with 24, USA and Spain shared a 28-fault scoreline for sixth and seventh placings, and Switzerland racked up a big 40-fault result to finish eighth ahead of the French.
