

Longines League of Nations™

The Longines League of Nations[™] (LLN) is an exciting new chapter in the history of the Nations Cup, equestrian sport's oldest and most prestigious series which as a concept - the nation vs nation competition - has existed since 1909!

Launched in 2024, the Longines League of Nations[™] represents the best of equestrian sport, featuring a unified and global format -unique to the series -where the top 10 nations compete at 4 qualifiers In Abu Dhabi (UAE), Ocala (USA), Rotterdam (NED) and St Tropez Gassin (FRA) in order to secure their spot at the Final in Barcelona (ESP), where the



best 8 teams go head-to-head for the highly coveted Longines League of Nations™ Trophy!

In short, it's the best 10 teams, competing over four qualifiers, with the top eight teams from the qualifiers competing in one Final.

Qualification of Teams

The winner of the LLN Final of the preceding LLN Season will be automatically qualified for the LLN of the following season, regardless of that NF's ranking in the relevant **Qualification Ranking**, and the remaining nine places will be allocated to the nine best ranked teams in the Qualification Ranking (excluding the LLN Final winner).

Competition Format

The LLN Competition is run over two rounds, with identical courses. Both rounds are run according to Table A against the clock.

The starting order of the first round of the first LLN Competition of the Season will be the reverse order of the Qualification Ranking for the LLN Series; the winner of the LLN Final of the preceding LLN Season (if eligible to participate in the LLN Season) will go last. For the subsequent LLN Competitions, the starting order of the first round will be the reverse order of the LLN Standings established after the previous LLN Competition. In case of a tie between NFs in the Qualification Ranking or LLN Standings, a draw for the NFs concerned will determine their starting order.

LLN Ocala Preview

Star-studded line-up announced for Longines League of Nations™ second leg in Ocala

Following the immense success of the inaugural Longines League of Nations[™] 2024 series, it returns in 2025 under the same unique format and continues to showcase the greatest human and equine Jumping athletes in the world.

The Chefs d'Equipe of the 10 highest ranked Jumping nations in the world have named the athletes selected to battle for victory and a star-studded lineup is promised for leg two of the Longines League of Nations[™] in Ocala (USA) in just over two weeks' time. Nine of the top 20 athletes on the current Longines Rankings will represent their nations in Ocala, amongst them Olympic, World and European Champions.

The Longines League of Nations[™] 2025 got underway in Abu Dhabi (UAE) last month and it was Ireland that took the spoils and 100 points with a flawless performance across the two rounds. UAE, invited to compete in the Abu Dhabi leg as the host nation, impressed to claim the second podium position, but were ineligible to collect league points. Consequently, third placed France collected the 90 points to sit second in the league and reigning champions Germany, who finished in fourth place, took 80 points, and hold third place in the league standings after one leg of the 2025 series

Germany wrote themselves into the history books in October as they became the first winners of the Longines League of Nations[™] Final, and in doing so, guaranteed their place in the series for 2025. Three of the four athletes from that victorious team (also all members of the team in Ocala last year) line up for their nation in Ocala. German intentions to defend that title have been made clear as they send out a team of protagonists headed by Paris Olympic Champion Christian Kukuk.

FEI Jumping European Champion from Riesenbeck in 2021 Andre Thieme is called upon again alongside Richard Vogel. Vogel sealed victory for Germany in Barcelona (ESP) as anchor leg, his double clear negating the need to jump-off for victory. Vogel's partner Sophie Hinners makes up the quartet, fresh from her eye catching double clear in Abu Dhabi's opening leg last month where Germany finished in fourth place.

Ireland, defending Champions from this leg last year, opened their 2025 campaign in invincible style as they scored a convincing win in Abu Dhabi last month. Over seven rounds of Jumping, Michael Blakes athletes didn't incur a single jumping fault and secured an undisputed victory on a score of zero (0), some eight faults ahead of their closest rivals UAE and 12 faults ahead of the next team in the league, France who took third place.

Team Ireland continue to exert their dominance around the world, and it is testament to the scope of talent available to him that Michael Blake has selected a completely different quartet from that which produced flawless performances in Abu Dhabi just a few weeks ago. None of his athletes selected for Ocala are strangers to leading their nation to team victories, and three of them did just that twelve months ago. Members of that triumphant team - Daniel Coyle, Darragh Kenny and Cian O'Connor - are joined by 2017 European Team gold medallist Bertram Allen. Originally named on the team for this leg last year, Allen had to stand down following a fall the week before which put him out of action. Shane Sweetnam proved an able deputy on that occasion and helped the Emerald Isle to victory.

Athletes from the Emerald Isle continue to consolidate their form across the globe. Whilst four of their athletes remained faultless to secure victory in Abu Dhabi just a few weeks ago, four more proved unbeatable stateside on the very same day, as they completed an Irish whitewash when taking the top four placing in the final Longines FEI Jumping World Cup[™] North American League qualifier. O'Connor headed the leaderboard with Coyle taking third. Just for good measure, Kenny secured seventh to see Ireland take five of the top seven places. For a nation with such a small population, they have proved they can consistently punch well above their weight, and with a team of seasoned performers on blistering form lined up in Ocala, they will be looking to deliver another lethal blow to their rivals.

France finished third in Abu Dhabi. Casualties of the new format whereby only three riders contest round two, they had completed round one on a zero score. Olympic and European gold medallist Kevin Staut is the only member of that team who lines up in Ocala. He comes here in typically consistent form having produced a double clear in Abu Dhabi and secured his position at the upcoming Longines FEI Jumping World Cup[™] Final in Basel (SUI) having headed the Western European League 2024/2025 standings. He is joined by French team stalwart Olivier Robert, Marc Dilasser and Longines League of Nations[™] debutant, Nina Mallevaey.

Other Longines League of Nations[™] debutants - Italy - send out three out of four of their fifth placed team from Abu Dhabi. National hero Piergiorgio Bucci lived up to the regard he is held in when producing an impressive double clear in Abu Dhabi. He is joined again by young sensation Giacomo Casadei and the in-form Giulia Martinengo Marquet. The immensely experienced Lorenzo de Luca completes the quartet as they vie for more points towards securing their place in Barcelona.

Reigning Olympic Team Champions Great Britain failed to make the final in Barcelona last year and will be hungry for a podium finish in Ocala. Di Lampard means business as she sends out two of her three Paris Olympic team athletes in triple Olympic gold Medallist Ben Maher and former U25 World number one Harry Charles. Two members from their sixth placed team in Abu Dhabi join them as World Championship Bronze medallist Joe Stockdale and Tim Gredley join forces once again to make up a formidable team for Great Britain.

2021 European Team gold medallists Switzerland field an almost identical quartet to the team that finished seventh in Abu Dhabi. Janika Sprunger, a member of the team that secured second position in Ocala last year is again joined by regular team members Romain Duguet and Edouard Schmitz. They are joined by young talent Géraldine Straumann.

Having finished on the podium in third place at the inaugural Longines League of Nations[™] Final in Barcelona, European and World champions Sweden send out three of the team members who secured gold at the FEI Jumping European Championships in Milan (ITA) 2023. Record breaking World Number One titleholder, World Champion and two-time World Cup Final winner Henrik von Eckermann (SWE) is called upon to bolster the chances of Sweden who finished in 11th place in Abu Dhabi, hampered undoubtedly by their fielding of a three-man team due to last minute injury of Petronella Andersson's ride.

Milan team mates Wilma Hellström and the ultra-reliable Rolf-Göran Bengtsson further enhance the chances of the decorated Jumping nation. Following impressive performances in the Longines FEI Jumping World Cup[™] series, Erika Lickhammer- van Helmond makes her Longines League of Nations[™] debut. Having won Abu Dhabi's 5* Grand Prix, Bengtsson emulated that form once again to provide a double clear in the Longines League of Nations[™] competition two days later. With no drop score, this was not enough to elevate Sweden into a second round qualifying position but he comes to Ocala on scorching form.

Henrik Ankarcrona fields a team of proven athletes to make amends for this uncharacteristic and disappointing start to their 2025 campaign, and the nation that has proved to be a dominant force time and time again come fired up to battle for supremacy once more.

Belgium finished a disappointing eighth in Abu Dhabi. Thibeau Spits produced a foot perfect opening round in Abu Dhabi but a final line blip second time round robbed him of the double clear that looked until that point inevitable. He will be joined by Niels Bruynseels, Riesenbeck European Team Bronze medallist Nicola Philippaerts and Emilie Conter. Like Great Britain they were surprise emissions from the Longines League of Nations[™] Final in Barcelona last year and will be hungry for their first podium finish.

The Netherlands finished second in the Longines League of Nations[™] Final in Barcelona last year but failed to reach the second round in Abu Dhabi last month. Tani Joosten produced a faultless performance there and is selected again alongside her Abu Dhabi team mate Kevin Jochems. Sanne Thijssen and Mathijs van Asten complete the quartet that bid to make amends for a disappointing start to The Netherlands' season.

Having fielded a relatively inexperienced team in Abu Dhabi that finished in 10th place, USA send out a quartet that know exactly how to deliver on big occasions for their home leg. Having finished third last year, Robert Ridland calls up three of the quartet that secured USA's podium position 12 months ago. Olympic and World Team champion Laura Kraut conjured up two faultless rounds last year and few would bet against her emulating that performance in two weeks' time. McLain Ward shares those accolades and delivered a clear and four faults last year.

Aaron Vale, a member of USA's Longines League of Nations[™] Final team in Barcelona joins them again in Ocala, and Lillie Keenan completes the quartet. The home nation will be vying for victory here and fighting for maximum points to help them on their way to qualification for Barcelona once more.

Ireland go into the second leg at the top of the league standings with 100 points, followed by France on 90, Germany on 80, Italy on 70 whilst Great Britain round out the top five on 60 points.

The second leg of the Longines League of Nations[™] 2025 will be staged in Ocala on Saturday 22 March 2025 and the world's top 10 Jumping nations will put on a show in their pursuit of victory and a coveted place at the most prestigious team Jumping final in the world.

What happened in Abu Dhabi?

Ireland are invincible in Abu Dhabi

Ireland's Chef d'equipe Michael Blake led his team to victory in the opening leg of the Longines League of Nations[™] 2025 series held in Abu Dhabi (UAE) this afternoon. His choice-blend of youth and experience proved a magic tonic as his four- man team of Denis Lynch (Vistogrand), Trevor Breen (Highland President), Jason Foley



(Chedington Hazy Toulana) and Michael Pender (HHS Los Angeles) conjured up a flawless performance across seven rounds of Jumping to see Ireland take the honours in the opening leg of the 2025 edition of the Longines League of Nations[™] in Abu Dhabi. They did this in convincing style, without a single fence falling to deliver a white wash victory and complete on a final score of zero faults.

The series is open to teams from the nine highest ranked nations on the Longines Ranking List in 2024 as well as the reigning Longines League of Nations[™] Final title holders. As winners of the 2024 Final and of the opening leg in Abu Dhabi last year, Germany were amongst the favourites to take victory here this afternoon. These ten nations were joined by the UAE, invited to compete in this leg of the series as host nation.

Determined to continue their rise amongst the highest ranked Jumping nations in the world, the UAE team, lead by Chef d'Equipe William Funnell, made their intentions clear from the outset as their pathfinder, 21-year-old Omar Abdul Aziz Al Marzooqi, the very first athlete to face the twelve fence challenge set by Santiago Varela (ESP) in round one, piloted his incredible stallion Enjoy de la Mure to perfection and delivered the first clear round of the competition.

When his team mates Abdullah Humaid Al Muhairi (Chacolu), Humaid Abdulla Khalifa Al Muhairi (Foncetti vd Heffinck) followed suit after the third rotation of athletes, UAE had guaranteed themselves a first round score of zero faults and a place in the second round, open only to the top eight nations after the culmination of round one.

Varela's course produced his customary balance of proving jumpable by the less experienced nations, whilst presenting challenges to the world's best combinations throughout. His up to height track made use of a variety of fence materials, strategically placed with a number of distance options and turns to wide oxers tight off the arena edges. It was a track that required concentration of athletes throughout and tested balance and obedience of their equine partners. His time allowed was generous, bringing the focus on pure Jumping and highlighting his main aim of showcasing the abilities of these wonderful equine athletes to the world.

His line of the oxer at fence five to the open water at six and a curving related distance of six or seven strides to the double of verticals at fence 7a and b proved influential as did the final line of the Longines combination on a six-stride distance to the final fence, a 1.61m vertical crowned with a delicate white plank. Whilst these lines caused some of the most experienced athletes to fault, the fact that only one fence on his track, the vertical at fence one, didn't fall, is testament to his course building genius.

Fourteen combinations produced faultless performances in round one with nine of those coming from athletes representing Ireland, UAE and France seeing all three nations finish the first round on zero.

Ireland's final athlete, Longines League of Nations[™] debutant Jason Foley, remarkably produced their fourth round without incurring a jumping fault. He finished with just two-time faults aboard his new ride of just a few weeks,



Chedington Hazy Toulana at their first show together, demonstrating not only the strength and depth of the Irish talent base, but also the ultimate faith that Michael Blake has in his athletes and the immense confidence and belief he instils in them.

Great Britain, Italy, Belgium, Germany and Switzerland made up the final eight teams qualified to contest round two over an identical track.

Starting again in reverse order of qualification after round one, athletes from Ireland, UAE and France were the last three nations to compete in the second round team rotations, with France last to go due to posting the fastest combined time of their athletes in round one.

A twist in the traditional Nations Cup format sees only three athletes from each of the eight nations come back to contest round two in the Longines League of Nations[™]. This creates an added element of pressure as every score counts and doesn't allow the luxury of a drop score.

In eighth and seventh place respectively, Switzerland and Germany put pressure on the leaders when their first two athletes produced clear rounds in round two, Sophie Hinners (GER) producing the first double clear of the competition. But when neither of their final leg athletes could replicate these scores, they relinquished their podium prospects. The chances of Belgium and Great Britain slipped further out of reach despite a clear from Jos Verlooy (BEL) and a double clear from Donald Whitaker (GBR) as two of their three athletes coming forward to round two faulted.

Italy came back from an uncharacteristic second round mistake incurred by pathfinder Giulia Martinengo Marquet who had been faultless in round one as the usually dependable Emanuele Camilli and Odense Odeveld resumed normal service second time round to provide a zero score in round two after a disappointing eight fault opener. The experience of Piergiorgio Bucci shone through as he posted a double clear for Italy with Hantano to see them finish in fifth place.

The battle for the podium positions remained between Ireland, UAE and France. Denis Lynch showed his team mates the way as he guided Vistogrand to a second flawless performance, maintaining their zero score. Omar Abdul Aziz Al Marzooqi picked up eight faults second time around, opening the door for France and Ireland. Simon Delestre delivered another clear round to see them neck and neck in the race for the title with two athlete rotations remaining.

Back from a career threatening injury sustained just nine months ago, Trevor Breen rode a second foot perfect round to pile the pressure on France to match their still faultless performance. UAE fought back as Abdullah Humaid Al Muhairi produced his second clear of the competition, putting his team right back in the reckoning. Under the new format the pressure was on the remaining athletes and Jeanne Sadran, faultless in round one for France, never found her rhythm around the track second time round, accruing an unexpected 12 faults for France dropping them below UAE with one athlete rotation remaining.

Ireland's anchorman Michael Pender knew that he could afford a fence down and still seal victory for his team, but two fences down would see them in a jump-off. However, no such cushion was required as the 25-year-old rider rode with a



confidence and nerve that belied his years as he expertly guided HHS Los Angeles to produce the third double clear for Ireland and complete an unprecedented white wash victory in which they completed seven rounds without incurring a jumping fault.

With the winners decided, the final podium positions came down to the final two riders of the competition. With UAE sitting in second position on eight faults, they couldn't afford a fence down from their anchorman. Abdullah Mohd Al Marri, having posted an unfortunate four faults in round one which was the drop score on that occasion, knew that only a clear round would do this time and he delivered exactly that under immense pressure in front of his home crowd to seal an incredible second place finish for the UAE.

Kevin Staut (FRA) set out as the final athlete of the competition. Knowing that first and second place were unattainable at this stage, France were fighting for third place and only a clear would secure this for them. His experience was visible as he expertly guided his long-term partner Visconti du Telman around the track without fault for the second time to give the pre- competition favourites some consolation with a third-place finish.

The Irish were understandably delighted with the result and Michael Blake was full of praise for his team.

"It's incredible, winning on zero is hard to do. Were a small nation, we're really punching above our weight! We were resilient today. I'm so proud of my boys. They jumped seven rounds today without a fence down. The Nations Cup's mean so much to Ireland so this really means everything."

He also expressed his gratitude to Denis Lynch for imparting his knowledge and experience upon his less experienced team members and "always taking them under his wing".

It was a fairy tale comeback for Trevor Breen who sustained a career threatening injury just nine months ago when fracturing three vertebrae in his neck and back after a fall in the Hamburg Grand Prix. For a period, he was told he would never ride again, but following a successful operation, the outlook became a little brighter day by day. He credits the support of his family, friends and team around him as well as following expert medical advice to the letter for his astonishing recovery and return to the very highest level of competition. To produce a double clear under these circumstances is fairy tale material, and to do it on a homebred horse, is simply the icing on the cake!

Having been the anchor leg for Ireland last year when they finished in second after a fault in his final round, Michael Pender was relieved to have put that ghost to rest



this time. Like all of his team mates his was full of praise for his hires HHS Los Angeles. "She's a very good horse, she's taken a bit more time than we'd hoped (to get to this level) but I'm very lucky to ride her. She jumped amazingly today"

Michael Blake's faith in Jason Foley was evident, selecting him on a horse that he'd only had the ride on for a few weeks and at their first show together. "Even people back home thought I was mad!" Blake joked, "But Jason is an incredible jockey, he's been placed in every nations cup team I've put him on and he always jumps clear rounds" he justified happily.

Jason said that it was a dream start to his first 5* Nations Cup. "I'm delighted to have formed a great partnership already with the mare and so grateful to Michael for putting his neck on the line for me!"

"We came here as underdogs but we came with a plan" concluded Denis Lynch who was delighted with Vistogrand and the incredible record he has maintained today, jumping clear at every Nations Cup he has been selected for'.

They may be small in population, but the tiny Emerlad Isle have justified their current ranking as the best team in the World and as powerhouses of the sport of Jumping.

After the first leg of the Longines League of Nations[™] 2025, Ireland head the leaderboard on 100 points ahead of France in second on 90 points and reigning champions Germany in third on 80 points.

The series moves across the Atlantic next month as Ocala (USA) hosts the second leg of the Longines League of Nations[™] 2025 on 22 March.
