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Including Guidelines and Equestrian Venue Requirements

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FEI CODE OF CONDUCT FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE

The FEI requires all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the Horse must be paramount. Welfare of the horse must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences. The following points must be particularly adhered to:

1. General Welfare:

a) Good Horses management

Stabling and feeding must be compatible with the best Horse management practices. Clean and good quality hay, feed and water must always be available.

b) Training methods

Horses must only undergo training that matches their physical capabilities and level of maturity for their respective disciplines. They must not be subjected to any training methods which are abusive or cause fear or for which they have not been properly prepared.

c) Farriery and tack

Foot care and shoeing must be of a high standard. Tack must be designed and fitted to avoid the risk of pain or injury.

d) Transport

During transportation, Horses must be fully protected against injuries and other health risks. Vehicles must be safe, well ventilated, maintained to a high standard, disinfected regularly and driven by competent staff. Competent handlers must always be available to manage the Horses.

e) Transit

All journeys must be planned carefully, and Horses allowed regular rest periods with access to food and water in line with current FEI guidelines.

2. Fitness to Compete:

a) Fitness and competence

Participation in Competition must be restricted to fit Horses and Athletes of proven competence. Horses must be allowed suitable rest period between training and competitions; additional rest periods should be allowed following travelling.

b) Health status

No Horse deemed unfit to compete may compete or continue to compete, veterinary advice must be sought whenever there is any doubt.

c) Doping and Medication

Any action or intent of doping and illicit use of medication constitute a serious welfare issue and will not be tolerated. After any veterinary treatment, sufficient time must be allowed for full recovery before Competition.

d) Surgical procedures

Any surgical procedures that threaten a competing horse's welfare or the safety of other horses and/or athletes must not be allowed.

e) Pregnant/recently foaled mares

Mares must not compete after their fourth month of pregnancy or with foal at foot.

f) Misuse of aids

Abuse of a Horse using natural riding aids or artificial aids (e.g. whips, spurs, etc.) will not be tolerated.

3. Events must not prejudice horse welfare:

a) Competition areas

Horses must only be trained and compete on suitable and safe surfaces. All obstacles and competition conditions must be designed with the safety of the Horse in mind.

b) Ground surfaces

All ground surfaces on which Horses walk, train or compete must be designed and maintained to reduce factors that could lead to injury.

c) Extreme weather

Competitions must not take place in extreme weather conditions that may compromise welfare or safety of the Horse. Provision must be made for cooling conditions and equipment for Horses after competing.

d) Stabling at Events

Stables must be safe, hygienic, comfortable, well ventilated and of sufficient size for the type and disposition of the Horse. Washing-down areas and water must always be available.

4. Humane treatment of horses:

a) Veterinary treatment

Veterinary expertise must always be available at an Event. If a Horse is injured or exhausted during a Competition, the Athlete must stop competing and a veterinary evaluation must be performed.

b) Referral centres

Wherever necessary, the Horse should be collected by ambulance and transported to the nearest relevant treatment centre for further assessment and therapy. Injured Horses must be given full supportive treatment before being transport.

c) Competition injuries

The incidence of injuries sustained in Competition should be monitored. Ground surface conditions, frequency of Competitions and any other risk factors should be examined carefully to indicate ways to minimise injuries.

d) Euthanasia

If injuries are sufficiently severe the Horse may need to be euthanized by a veterinarian as soon as possible on humane grounds and with the sole aim of minimising suffering.

e) Retirement

Horses must be treated sympathetically and humanely when they retire from Competition.

5. Education:

a) The FEI urges all those involved in equestrian sport to attain the highest possible levels of education in areas of expertise relevant to the care and management of the Competition Horse.

This Code of Conduct for the Welfare of the Horse may be modified from time to time and the views of all are welcomed. Particular attention will be paid to new research findings and the FEI encourages further funding and support for welfare studies.

CHAPTER I – GENERAL

Article 1 – INTRODUCTION

This booklet sets out the special rules and qualification procedures for the Youth Equestrian Games. It must be read in conjunction the FEI Rules and Regulations including but not limited to the FEI Statutes, FEI General Regulations, FEI Rules for Jumping and FEI Veterinary Regulations, all of which remain in force except where otherwise specified.

A dispute resolution procedure is provided in the FEI Statutes and FEI General Regulations. In accordance with this procedure, the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS) in Lausanne, Switzerland has the exclusive jurisdiction to be the final forum to resolve all disputes concerning these events.

The FEI is responsible for the technical supervision of the preparations of facilities and for the technical control of the competitions.

Article 2 - COMPETITIONS

The following competitions, which will take place on borrowed horses, will be included in the Youth Equestrian Games programme:

1. Jumping - Team Competition
2. Jumping - Individual Competition

In addition to the above medal competitions, the following will be organised:

- An Official Training session will be held in the main stadium before the Team Jumping Competition. See Annex D for competition schedule.

Article 3 - COMPETITION PROGRAMMES

A programme containing all details in regard to the competitions will be produced by the OC for the public attending the Event. This programme should include, e.g., the description of all competitions, competition timetable, biographies of all competitors taking part, participation list of competitors, course-designs description as well as a list of Officials functioning.

Article 4 - CLASSIFICATION, MEDALS & PRIZES

4.1 MEDAL COMPETITIONS

Only one (1) set of medals will be awarded for each medal competition.

4.2 PRIZES

4.2.1 Individual Medals and diplomas are awarded to the individual competitors placed 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Diplomas are awarded to the individual competitors placed 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th.

4.2.2 Teams Medals and diplomas are awarded to all members of teams placed 1st, 2nd and 3rd providing competitors that have taken part in at least one competition or test.

Diplomas are awarded to each team member placed 4th, 5th and 6th.

4.2.3 Horses Rosettes (ribbons) and stable plaques provided by the OC will be awarded to the horses of all competitors who have received a medal or a diploma.

Article 5 - QUOTA

5.1 TOTAL QUOTA

Thirty (30) competitors will be eligible and allowed to participate at the Youth Equestrian Games 2022, and thirty eight (38) horses will be allowed to enter the stables as follows:

5.1.1 Jumping: thirty (30) competitors with thirty (30) borrowed horses with the addition of eight (8) reserve horses.

A maximum number of one (1) competitor per NF is allowed to enter the Youth Equestrian Games.

Article 6 - ELIGIBILITY OF COMPETITORS AND HORSES

6.1. NATIONALITY

6.1.1 In accordance with the spirit of the Youth Olympic Games, Athletes competing in the Youth Equestrian Games must hold the nationality of the country they are competing for.

6.1.2 Exceptions to the nationality requirement:

- a) If an associate state, province or overseas department, a country or a colony acquires independence; if a country becomes incorporated within another country by reason of a change of border; or if a new NF is recognized by the FEI, an Athlete may continue to represent the country to which the Athlete belongs or belonged if that country continues to have an NF member of the FEI. However, the Athlete may, if the Athlete prefers, choose to represent their new NF. This particular choice must receive the approval of the FEI and may be made only once.
- b) An Athlete Living Outside Their Country of Nationality (as defined in the FEI General Regulations) who: (i) loses their nationality; (ii) becomes a refugee; or (iii) whose home country does not have an NF which is a member of the FEI, can compete for their country of residence in the Youth Equestrian Games.
- c) Athletes whose country of citizenship does not have an NF which is a member of the FEI, and whose situation does not qualify under paragraphs a) and b) above, may receive special authorisation from the FEI to compete in the Youth Equestrian Games under the FEI flag, in exceptional circumstances and on a case by case basis.

6.1.3 All matters relating to the determination of the country; which an Athlete may represent in the Youth Equestrian Games shall be resolved by the FEI.

6.2. COMPETITORS

6.2.1 To be eligible for participation in the Youth Equestrian Games, competitors must comply with all current FEI Regulations;

6.2.2 From the year competitors reach their 15th birthday and including the year in which they reach their 18th birthday, competitors are eligible to take part in the Youth Equestrian Games.

6.3 HORSES

6.3.1 Age Horses of any origin and a minimum of ~~eight (8)~~ **seven (7)** years of age (the age being counted from 1st January of the year of birth) are eligible to compete;

6.3.3 Passports: Any horse entered for the Youth Equestrian Games competitions must have a valid FEI passport or an FEI approved national passport with an accompanying valid FEI Recognition card as a means of identification. These documents must be valid and completed to the required standard at the time of the competitions;

6.3.4 Name of horse: according to art 138.2 of the FEI General Regulations, 24th edition, a commercial prefix or suffix may be added to the name and must be entered in the passport.

Article 7 - DEADLINES FOR QUALIFICATION OF NATIONS, ELIGIBILITY STANDARD AND CERTIFICATES OF CAPABILITY

7.1 QUALIFICATION OF NATIONS

The deadline for National Federations NFs to gain eligibility to take part in the Youth Equestrian Games is 31 December 2021.

NFs will be informed by FEI, after the above-mentioned deadline of their eligibility in the Youth Equestrian Games 2022. Eligible NFs must inform the FEI in writing by 15 February 2022 whether or not they intend to participate at the Youth Equestrian Games. A positive answer will imply that this NF is qualified to participate at the Youth Equestrian Games.

The FEI will reallocate all available places by 01 March 2022.

7.2 MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR PARTICIPATION AT THE YOUTH EQUESTRIAN GAMES

7.2.1 FEI Nominated entries must be accompanied by Certificates of Capability and must be received by FEI no later than 15 May 2022, midnight (Swiss time).

7.2.2 Certificates of Capability: NFs qualified to take part at the Youth Equestrian Games must send a Certificate of Capability for all competitors nominated, on a form provided by the FEI (see Annex A), to FEI no later than 15 May 2022 midnight (Swiss time). Athletes for whom Certificates of Capability have not been received on time will not be allowed to participate. The Certificate of Capability must include a record of the results obtained in competitions satisfying the requirements as laid down in the rules of the Jumping discipline confirming that the competitors have the necessary experience and ability to participate at the required standard.

The FEI will to accept the entry of competitor(s) that have not reached the minimum required eligibility standard.

7.3 FINAL ENTRIES:

The Final Entry date is 01 June 2022.

By this date, NFs must provide entries by name on a form entitled "Entry Form" directly to OC with a copy to the FEI. These entries will include the competitors having reached the minimum standard requirements from countries having achieved qualification according to

the procedure established by the FEI. All qualifications must have been previously confirmed by the FEI as per above.

The number of competitors entered on the Official Entries is one (1).

Article 8 - FILL-UP OF QUOTA

If a qualified nation finds itself unable to compete after the nominated entries of 15 May 2022, it must inform the FEI immediately, in order to provide the opportunity to other nations to participate.

The fill-up of quota may only be made in accordance with the procedure laid down in article 17 of this document.

Article 9 – SUBSTITUTION

9.1 Substitutions to the Final Entry list will only be allowed in the event of an accident or illness of competitors on the production of a certificate from an officially recognised doctor;

9.2 Substitutions can only be made with another competitor that has obtained the minimum eligibility standard for participation in accordance with the relevant rules and providing that the competitor(s) has/have been duly entered on the list of nominated entries of 15 May 2022.

By 15 May 2022 NFs must nominate to FEI the list of all competitors (nominated entry list) who will possibly be entered for the Youth Equestrian Games at the time of Final Entries. **Reserve riders also have to be entered by this date.** Any substitution made according to these rules must be made by a competitor entered from this list.

9.3 Substitution of Athletes must be made prior to the deadline date of Final entries 01 June 2022.

The FEI will put in place a policy regarding late athlete replacement, in case an athlete is unable to participate due to injury, or other exceptional circumstances, following the deadline date for Final Entries. In principle, a replacement may be made by the NF of the competitor in question 1 hour prior to the Horse Inspection.

In case the NF in question no longer has eligible athletes, the quota place will be reallocated according to the qualification system. The deadline for this specific replacement will be determined with the FEI and communicated by early 2022 to all NFs. (If the NF in question is unable to replace its Athlete a substitution may be made by the next best qualified NF from the same Group by a deadline date to be established by the FEI)

9.4 Eight (8) reserve horses are provided by OC. Substitutions will be allowed in the following cases:

9.4.1 In the event of an accident or illness of a horse upon presentation of a Veterinary Certificate from the Veterinary Commission;

9.4.2 For Veterinary reasons substitution of a horse can take place prior the Warm Up session or Between the Team Competition and the Individual Final.

9.4.3 In case of incompatibility of the competitor and the horse. Decisions on substitutions are taken by the Ground Jury in consultations with the Chief Steward and an OC representative.

9.4.4 Requests for substitution of a Horse must be presented by the Chef d'Equipe to the Ground Jury not later than the day prior to the start of the first official competition - Team Competition.

9.5 In case of a substitution of a horse after the Training session on the Third day, or between the Team Competition and the Individual Final Competition, at least one additional Training Session must be scheduled for the new combination to allow Athlete to familiarize himself with the horse prior to taking part in an Official Competition.

Article 10 - OFFICIALS

10.1 GROUND JURIES

The President and Members of the Ground Jury are appointed by the FEI in consultation with the FEI Jumping Committee.

Their travel and accommodation expenses will be met by the OC.

10.2 VETERINARY COMMISSION

10.2.1 A Veterinary Commission is responsible for the veterinary supervision of the event. It shall be composed of a President, a Foreign Veterinary Delegate and one (1) Associate member, all of whom must be selected from FEI list of National Head Veterinarians and Official Veterinarians;

10.2.2 The President and the Associate Member shall be appointed by the NF of the country where the Games are held with the approval of the FEI Veterinary Committee.

10.2.3 The Foreign Veterinary Delegate shall be appointed by the FEI and the OC in agreement with the FEI Veterinary Committee.

10.2.4 The powers, obligations and responsibilities of the Veterinary Commission are laid down in the FEI Veterinary Regulations.

10.2.5 The travel and accommodation expenses for a pre-visit of the FVD as well as other costs of the President and Members of the Veterinary Commission will be met by OC if they are national officials. Travel expenses of international officials will be met by the OC.

10.2.6 The Veterinary Commission must arrive at the venue for the Games not later than the day prior to the first Horse Inspection.

10.3 COURSE DESIGNER

The Course Designer must be selected from the FEI list of Level Four Course Designers.

The Course Designer will be appointed by OC from a list of three (3) names drawn up by the FEI Jumping Committee.

The travel, accommodation expenses and other fees will be met by OC.

10.4 CHIEF STEWARD

The Chief Steward for the Youth Equestrian Games is selected by the FEI.

Article 11 - TECHNICAL DELEGATE

11.1 TECHNICAL DELEGATE (FEI JUMPING RULES, 27th Edition, art 259.4.2)

11.1.1 One (1) Foreign Technical Delegate shall be appointed by the FEI in consultation with the FEI Jumping Committee.

The Foreign Technical Delegate for Jumping is selected from the FEI list of Level Four Course Designers or Retired Level Four Course Designers.

11.1.2 The Foreign Technical Delegate's powers, obligations and responsibilities are laid down in the, FEI General Regulations and in the FEI Jumping Rules.

11.1.3 The Foreign Technical Delegate is required, before the Games, to:

A. Give their opinion in regard to administrative and logistic arrangements for the accommodation, transportation and meals for all technical officials, judges, grooms and competitors. The Foreign Technical Delegate must also check arrangements for the transportation, stabling and fodder for the horses.

B. Approve the sites for the competitions including the practice and schooling areas.

C. Check the general layout of the competition venue.

D. Ensure that the courses and arenas are thoroughly tested:

- The Foreign Technical Delegate needs to ensure that the footing of the arena is of required standard. The Foreign Technical Delegate may request that arena surface be tested and that horses and obstacles be made available to test the condition of the arena the Foreign Technical Delegate is also responsible for ensuring the design of the obstacles created by the Course Designer are according to FEI Rules.

E. Be present at least one (1) whole day prior to the first Horse Inspection.

11.2 FEI VETERINARY DELEGATE

An FEI Veterinary Delegate (FVD) shall be appointed by the FEI to assist and advise the OC on the preparations for the Games and approve the veterinary and medication control infrastructure.

Article 12 – MEDICATION CONTROL OF PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES OF ATHLETES

The FEI Anti-Doping Rules for Human Athletes (ADRHA) will apply to all competitors participating in the Youth Equestrian Games (refer to ANNEX G).

Article 13 - CONTROL OF PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES OF HORSES

Control for Prohibited Substances will be carried out as set out in the FEI Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication Rules for the 2022 Youth Equestrian Games, and the FEI Veterinary Regulations (refer to Annex E).

13.1 SELECTION OF HORSES FOR TESTING (see also Veterinary Regulations)

Should an FEI horse require treatment with a Controlled Medication, the treatment must be recorded in the horse's FEI Medication Logbook. A withdrawal period must be observed before the horse competes and PRs may submit samples for Elective Testing at any time.

If a horse requires treatment in an emergency shortly before an event, a Veterinary Form A must be completed and given to the Veterinary Delegate on arrival at the event. Submission of a Veterinary Form A does not guarantee that the horse will be accepted to compete in the event.

Article 14 - RESPONSIBILITY

Neither OC nor the FEI accepts any responsibility for any accident or illness that may befall any horse, competitor, groom or any other person. The same applies in case of damage to cars, saddlery, utensils and all other objects (including damage resulting from theft, loss, fire).

OC is responsible to ensure that it has a third party insurance policy to cover any eventuality that can occur during or in relation to the Youth Equestrian Games.

Article 15 – PROTESTS AND APPEALS

15.1 The procedure regarding the lodging of protest and appeals are laid down in the FEI General Regulations.

15.2 All protest to the Ground Jury during the Youth Equestrian Games must be accompanied by a deposit of CHF 150 or equivalent.

15.3 The procedure for appeals is set out in Article 162 of the FEI General Regulations.

Article 16 - RULES FOR THE JUMPING COMPETITIONS

16.1 OFFICIAL TRAINING SESSION

16.1.1 ~~The An~~ Official Training Session ~~will be held is held in the main competition arena~~. A course with approximately ten (10) obstacles including a combination will be provided. Competitors have ninety (90) seconds to complete the course or any number of obstacles on the course. The training session is observed by the Ground Jury. No results are registered.

16.1.2 All Athletes must be present for the draw for the Horses and must take part in the training session to be eligible to compete in the Official Competitions.

16.2 OFFICIAL JUMPING COMPETITION

16.2.1 First Competition - Team Competition

One (1) team per Continent – total thirty 30 competitors (six (6) teams).

Each Team consists of maximum five (5) competitors. The best three (3) results per team count in each round (there are two (2) drop scores per team).

Format

Two (2) rounds not against the clock over the same course with a jump-off against the clock in case of equality of penalties for 1st, 2nd and/or 3rd place. All six (6) teams return for the second round. **Only one competitor per team** take part in the possible jump-off.

Starting order

The starting order of the teams in the first round is established according to a draw. As this is a Continental Team competition format, the order of starting in each team will be decided by the Chefs d'Equipe.

The starting order of the teams in the second round is according to the reverse order of the total penalties incurred by the three (3) best competitors in each team in the first round. Teams with equality of penalties will retain the starting order of the first round.

The order of starting in the possible jump-off will be the same as in the second round. If more than one jump-off is required to determine medal placing, the jump-off for third place will take place before the jump-off for first and second place. Teams retain the same order of starting as the second round.

Classification

The team classification is decided by adding the penalties incurred by the best three (3) competitors of each team in each of the two (2) rounds. In the case of equality of penalties between the teams for first, second and/or third place, a jump-off against the clock is compulsory in which all team competitors participate. The score in the jump-off is obtained by adding the penalties incurred by the three (3) best competitors in each team, but in the event of further equality of penalties, the times of these three (3) competitors in the jump-off added together will decide the winning team as well as those placed second or third. Teams with equality of total penalties for other places are placed equal.

Obstacles and other technical requirements

Number of Obstacles: twelve (12)

Min/Max length of the course: 500m/600m

Height: Maximum 120cm Spread: Maximum 130cm Speed: 350 m/min

The course must comprise one (1) treble combination or two (2) doubles. In the case of a jump-off, this will take place over a reduced course of six obstacles, which may not be raised or widened.

16.2.2 Second Competition – Final Individual Competition

Format

One rounds judged under Table A not against the clock with a jump-off against the clock in case of equality of penalties for 1st, 2nd and/or 3rd place. (Art. 238.1.2 of the FEI Jumping Rules).

Starting order

The starting order is established according to a draw.

The order of starting in the possible jump-off will be the same as the first round.

Classification

The Individual classification is determined for each competitor by the penalties incurred in the first round. In case of equality of penalties for first, second and/or third place, a jump-off against the clock is compulsory. If more than one jump-off is required to determine medal placing, the jump-off for the third place will take place before the jump-off for the first and second place. In case of equality of penalties and time for any of the medal placing after the first jump-off, there is a second jump-off over the same course. In case of equality of penalties and time after the second jump-off, the competitors concerned are placed equal. Athletes not

participating in the jump-off will be placed according to their Penalties in the first round.

Obstacles and other technical requirements

Course: Number of obstacles twelve (12) Min/Max length of course: 500m/600m

Height: Maximum 130cm Spread: Maximum 140cm Speed: 350 m/min

The course of must comprise one (1) treble combination or two (2) doubles.

In the case of a jump-off, this will take place over a reduced course of six obstacles, which may not be raised or widened.

16.3 DECLARATION OF STARTERS (TEAMS & INDIVIDUALS)

16.3.1 Team Competition

Chefs d'Equipe must declare, no later than 18.00hrs the day prior to the Team competition, the order of starting of team members within their teams. This must be done following the draw for the Team competition.

16.3.2 Final Individual Competition

Chefs d'Equipe must declare competitors that will take part in the Final Individual competition. Declarations must be made prior to the draw. The draw takes place following the second Horse Inspection.

16.4 HORSE INSPECTIONS

There will be a first Horse Inspection followed by a re-inspection is necessary prior to the Team competition. There will be a second Horse Inspection prior to the Final Individual competition.

The order of presenting Horses for the first Horse Inspection will follow the alphabetical order of names of horses.

The order of presenting Horses for the second Horse Inspection will follow the alphabetical order of competitors NF abbreviations.

16.5 Preliminary Timetable

1st Day : Horse Inspection, Draw for Horses, Horse Parade

2nd Day : Training Session

3rd Day : Training Session

4th Day : "Welcome Competition" not part of the Medals Competitions

5th Day : Rest Day

7th Day : Team Competition 1st Round

8th Day : Team Final Competition 2nd Round & Jump-Off – Team Medal Ceremony

Article 17 - QUALIFICATION PROCEDURE – JUMPINGQUOTA: THIRTY (30) COMPETITORS (EIGHT (8) RESERVE HORSES)

C. ATHLETE ELIGIBILITY**Age**

To be eligible to participate in the Youth Equestrian Games, athletes must have been born between 1 January 2004 and 31 December 2007.

Additional IF requirements**Certificate of Capability**

All athletes taking part in the YEG must have obtained a Certificate of Capability confirming that the athlete has fulfilled the minimum eligibility requirements for the 2022 YEG. Athletes who achieve the results according to either of the following paragraphs will earn a Certificate of Capability:

1. Athletes who achieve a score of not more than eight penalties in the first round of any of the following competitions
 - 2021 FEI Jumping European Junior Championship;
 - 2021 FEI Jumping North American Junior Championship;
 - 2021 FEI Jumping South American Junior Championship;
 - CS11* Grand Prix Competition;
 - CS12* Grand Prix Competition.

E. CONFIRMATION PROCESS FOR QUOTA PLACES

CONFIRMATION OF QUALIFICATION PLACE

The FEI shall confirm to the NFs having earned a qualification place through the 2021 FEI Jumping Continental Junior Championships immediately following the respective Championships.

NFs will then have up to two (2) weeks, from the date of being notified by the FEI that the NF has earned a quota place to confirm in writing to the FEI that they will use the obtained places.

The FEI will confirm to the NFs having earned a qualification place through the 2021 Competition 3 of the FEI Jumping World Challenge Category A by 31 January 2022.

NFs will then have up to two weeks to confirm in writing to the FEI that they will use the obtained place.

CONFIRMATION OF HOST COUNTRY PLACES

The host country must confirm in writing to the FEI and OC by 15 February 2022 the use of its Host Country Places.

CHAPTER III - STABLES, SERVICES AND TRAINING FACILITIES

Article 18 - INTRODUCTION

The Youth Equestrian Games bring together the best qualified young competitors from all over the world to compete for the most coveted award in the Youth's equestrian sports. It is therefore most important that the accommodation, health and feeding facilities for horses, grooms and competitors and the facilities for training and practice should be satisfactory in every respect. The following guidelines/directives are designed to help Organising Committees to provide for the needs of the horses, grooms, competitors and Team Officials.

Article 19 - STABLES

19.1 Provision of suitable stables with adequate lighting and ventilation (60 m³ air space for each horse). Loose boxes must be of at least nine (9) square metres. They should be disinfected before arrival and after departure of the horses.

Preferably the stable design should include a roof some distance above the stalls, reflecting heat and allowing airflow over the stabled boxes or the stables should be air-conditioned.

19.2 Each team must be provided with one (1) tack room (six (6) tack rooms in total).

19.3 Each stable block will require:

19.3.1 A supply of drinking water and drinking buckets, at least one outlet per 10 boxes;

19.3.2 Hot water, cold water hoses and ice readily available;

19.3.3 A regular routine for the collection and disposal of used bedding and manure;

19.3.4 A supply of straw and shavings for bedding material;

19.3.5 Fire precautions and a plan for emergencies, (it is important to keep passage ways free of obstructing material/tack in case of emergencies);

19.3.6 A security system designed to keep all unauthorised persons out of the stable areas (refer to Veterinary Regulations);

19.3.7 Tying up facilities in the stables and the passage ways;

19.3.8 At least one electrical power point for each team, out of reach of the horses;

19.3.9 A restroom for grooms and competitors in the stable block plus a room for the team officials in the stable area;

19.3.10 Vector and insect control (i.e. screening for insect control if required, sand around stables for tick control, if required).

Article 20 - CENTRAL SERVICES

20.1 All commonly used feeds should be available including hay, bran, oats, barley, sweet feed, pellets or cubes, corn, linseed and carrots, certified free of prohibited substances.

20.2 Storage facilities for feed and bedding.

20.3 Workshops for repairing tack.

20.4 A qualified farrier with sufficient assistants is required to provide a quick and reliable service at all times of the day and night.

20.5 A small isolation stable - not less than four (4) boxes - should be provided at some distance from the stable area to provide temporary isolation for horses thought to be suffering from a contagious infection.

20.6 Suitable facilities including not less than four (4) boxes must be provided for injured horses and horses needing veterinary attention. These can be included in a temporary structure located in large air-conditioned tent and an experienced veterinary team to provide 24 hour emergency veterinary treatment and possible surgical procedures. A means of access suitable in all weather conditions for horse trailers is necessary, power, water supply and sewer connection. A referral surgical equine clinic in the vicinity is desirable. Details on the design and the required standard of veterinary facilities can be obtained from the FEI Veterinary Department and they must be agreed well in advance with the FEI Veterinary Committee.

20.7 All appointed Veterinary Officials must be in possession of the FEI veterinarian ID card as required by the Veterinary Regulations.

20.8 Not less than four (4) boxes must be provided for the Horse Medication Control.

20.9 A conference room, with microphone, loud speakers and visual aid equipment, is required in the vicinity of the management area for the technical briefing meetings, draws for starting orders and where notices and results can be displayed.

20.10 A lockable letter box for each nation for official communications to Chefs d'Equipes and the Individual competitors.

20.11 A joint working room for Team leaders with Wi-Fi internet access, work terminal with internet access, access to INFO, telephone, photocopier and secure lockers.

20.12 A service of surveillance in the stables during the night.

Article 21 - ACCOMMODATION AND CATERING

21.1 Horses, Trainers and Grooms must be housed as close to the stables as possible.

21.2 Horses, Trainers, Grooms and other team officials resident at the equestrian site(s) must be provided with adequate washing, bathing or shower facilities, as well as catering facilities and laundry facilities, as close to the stables as possible.

Article 22 - SCHOOLING AREAS

22.1 GENERAL

22.1.1 In all schooling areas the ground surface is of the utmost importance to all competitors. Great care should be taken to see that the horses can come to no harm in the selected areas. Deep sand is dangerous. Newly levelled and seeded areas are liable to have soft patches and grass areas may become too hard if there is no provision for watering.

22.1.2 There must be at least two (2) large areas (50 x 100m), with an all-weather footing for training.

22.2 JUMPING FACILITIES

22.2.1 The competition arena must have a size of 60m x 90m and be covered with either a permanent or temporary roof in case of bad weather; Sufficient fence material of the same general specifications as those approved for the competition arenas must be provided in each area to allow the construction of ten (10) obstacles including material for a treble combination.

22.2.2 The Jumping areas must be strictly supervised at all times by an FEI steward to ensure that any form of abuse is prohibited (see General Regulations and the Jumping Rules).

22.3 OFFICIAL TRAINING SESSION

22.3.1 Should competitions take place a night-time, training under floodlight must be organised by OC.

22.3.2 Jumping: OC, in agreement with the Foreign Technical Delegate must organise an Official Training Session for competitors ~~in the main competition arena~~ as follows:

- An Official Training Session takes place the day prior to the first official competition and **a course will be provided which** must consist of maximum ten (10) obstacles, including a combination; maximum height 1.25 m height;
- Each competitor is permitted a maximum of ninety (90) seconds per horse;
- Dress is informal; boots, breeches, shirt and protective headgear must be worn;
- The training session is open to all competitors and horses (plus reserve horses) and five (5) horses per team;
- The public may not be charged to enter and prizes of any kind may not be offered;
- A draw will take place the day prior to the training session to determine the starting order of the nations in the training session. Chefs d'Equipe will determine the starting order of the competitors within the teams.

ARTICLE 23 - FAMILIARISATION

The day prior to the Official Training Session, all competitors will be permitted to have a familiarisation session in the main competition arena with obstacles.

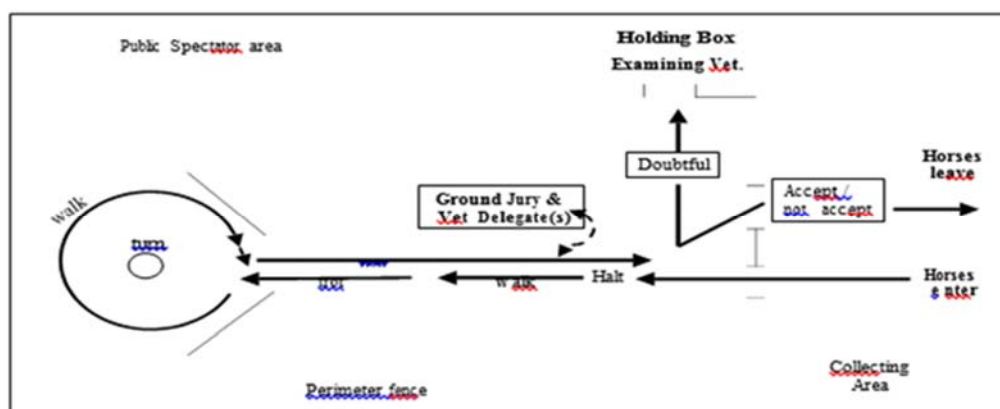
